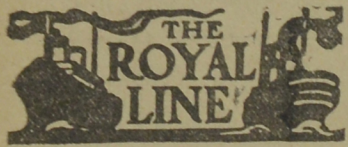

## FLEMMING'S PROMISES AND PERFORMANCES

When Premier Fleming was in opposition his leader, Mr. Hazen, appealed to the people on a platform with eight planks in it. They were:

(A) That if returned to power they would put all public works to tender, and award the contract for the same lowest tenderer.

(B) That they would conduct and carry on a government free from all party lines political bias and prejudice.

(C) That they would repeal the present Highway Act and enact a new law in its place, which should vest the management of the roads and the appointment of all officials absolutely in the County Councils.

(D) That they would have a survey and a valuation of our Crown Lands made so that this valuable asset might be conserved.

(E) That they would inaugurate and establish a new Agricultural Immigration policy, giving particular attention to the promotion of the settling of our lands by our own people.

(F) That they would improve the quality and reduce the price of our school books, so that our people would not be robbed of thousands of dollars.

(G) That they would aid and extend and encourage local and rural schools so that every parent could have an opportunity to give a child an elementary education.

(H) That they should increase the Provincial allowance to school teachers.

When Messrs Hazen and Fleming appeared on the public platform they were fond of enlarging upon this platform. This complaint was that all of the public works were put up to public tender. Their platform was to put all the public works up to public tender.

The fact is they do not put nearly as much work up to public tender as their predecessors did. They do the public's work by day's work and ignore tender. They place the job with their political supporters and favorites and the people pay the price.

THE "NO-PARTY-LINES" JOKE

What a farce they have made of the second plank—conducting a government free from all party lines, political bias and prejudice. One has only to recall how the Liberal office-holders lost their positions just as soon as Hazen learned of his majority.

What about the third plank to vest the management of the roads and the appointment of all officials absolutely in the county councils? The secretaries of the highway boards presented by the government have more power than all the other officials. They get the government money and spend it and render no account of their expenditure.

They have paid no attention whatever to a survey and valuation of the crown lands, as promised in the fourth plank, but they have gone in to the school book business and cancelled a contract that called for high prices.

They have placed an enormous official expenditure in the agricultural department and charge it against the farmers; they have carried out the orchard policy of the old government and added two officials to do the work at salaries amounting to \$2,500 a year.

The performances of the government have not kept pace with their promises. Today they are appealing to the people without reference to any of these plans save those referring to school books and agriculture.

But Premier Fleming in his manifesto does not say that the government has made the selling of school books a part of the patronage of the government. Only these store-keepers in the country recommend by the government members can sell school books a part of the patronage of the government have been put to great inconvenience because of this discrimination.

## STRIKING WORKERS KEPT IN CHECK

London, May 28—The force of 2,000 policemen mobilized in the vicinity of the London dockyards has been thus far able and successful to circumvent the designs of the striking transport workers to inflict a famine on the people of London as the quickest means of securing the concession of their demands.

The men still express themselves as determined to insist on the recognition of the trade unions and demand the exclusion of non-unionists from the port of London, uniform rate of wage for all ship work with a minimum of seven shillings and six pence daily and they have posted pickets everywhere around the dock entrances. The big meat supply firms of the metropolis have been successfully running the blockade of the pickets today with long trains of trolleys laden with hundreds of tons of chilled and frozen beef and the Smithfield meat market today is better stocked than usual.

The government has given assurances that it will furnish all the protection necessary for the precautions of the unchecked delivery of food supplies and the evidence that the authorities intend to make good these promises has greatly incensed the strikers, who find themselves localized in London. The danger therefore, of the declaration of a national strike has become more acute and it seems probable that if Ben Tille and Harry Gosling, the men's leaders, can carry the day an attempt will be made to call out all the transport workers of the United Kingdom possibly tomorrow. The effect of the London strike on the provincial ports is already considerable. The shipping companies of Glasgow, Hull and other centres trading with London have been compelled to suspend their sailings thus throwing out of work large numbers of men.

With the exception of the supplies of food, the whole trade of the port of London is now paralyzed and not a truck wheel is moving in the streets. Beyond verbal demonstrations the strikers overawed by the big force of police, have not attempted any disorders. It is estimated that they now number 140,000 men.

## \$25,000,000 RAILWAY FOR AUSTRALIA

London, May 29—The first practical step towards the construction of Australia's proposed \$25,000,000 railway was taken today, when bids for 135,000 tons of steel rails were received at the High Commissioner's office in this city. The railway is to be the biggest enterprise of its kind ever undertaken in Australia. The line will be known as the Federal Transcontinental Railway and will extend from Port Augusta in South Australia to Kalgoorlie in Western Australia. The route is more than 1,000 miles in length and a considerable portion of it extends across a desert. The government proposes to do the entire work itself without the intervention of a contractor.
