ROYAL BLACK CHAPTER FINISHES ITS SESSION

Sir Mackenzie Bowell among Speakers at Tuesday's Session--Many Topics Discussed by Rev. Canon Walsh

The Grand Black Chapter of British America meeting resumed after adjournment with the officers in their respective places, the Acting Grand Master calling the Chapter to order at 2.30 p.m.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell was introduced by M. W. Sir Knight Parkhill and was greeted by the Acting Grand Master on behalf of the members of the Grand Chapter, who gave him a most cordial welcome. Sir Mackenzie in acknowledging the reception, spoke of the time, over sixty years ago, when he became an active member of the Orange Association and said that when he was invited by Lt.-Col. Scott to pay a visit to this session of the Grand Lodge he made up his mind at once to accept, whatever the consequences. He referred to his incumbency of the highest office which was in the power of the Orange Association to confer on any one of its members and said it was one of the proudest positions he ever held. Sir Mackenzie advised the members to live up to their traditions and take care of their Canadianism as there was nothing better than that one should be able to call himself "Canuck." If the Institution was true to the principles it professed, there would never be any fear of Canada becoming an adjunct of the United States. The hon. gentleman gave some of his experiences while attending the Triennial Council some fifty years ago, several of them being most humorous. Before sitting down Sir Mackenzie thanked the members for their magnificent reception.

Another old member of the Orange Association in the person of Frank Somers was introduced at the same time and also returned thanks for his reception.

REV. CANON WALSH.

In replying to the address of the venerable brethren, Most Worshipful Rev. Canon Wm. Walsh testified to the pleasure the Sir Knights present felt at receiving a visit from an ex-premier of Canada and said that he counted forty-seven years since he first knew Sir Mackenzie and during that time he had been gaining an ever-increasing respect for his integrity and talent and he was glad that Providence had taken care of him. He considered it an honor and a privilege to have Hon. Mackenzie Bowell a visitor at this time.

CHANGES IN CONSTITUTION.

A number of changes were made in the laws of the Institution on recommendations made by the Committee on Constitution and Laws.

REPORT ON CORRESPONDENCE.

The Committee on Correspondence presented an elaborate and comprehensive report in which they touched upon the various matters contained in the Grand Master's and Grand Registrar's reports, chief among them being the Home Rule Bill, the Ne Temere Decree and the Schools Question, besides paying a tribute to the Grand Registrar for the efficient

way in which he had performed the duties of his office during the year.

HOME RULE BILL.

The pronouncement of the committee on the Home Rule Bill was very clear, expressing pleasure that all sections of the Protestants of Ireland were alive to the seriousness of the situation that they realized they should act in common with the other members of the Empire, a world-wide dominion, and felt that it was utterly absurd to demand that Ireland be a nation once again when she never was a nation and never need be.

The safeguards proposed were only things of straw and should the Home Rule Bill become an established fact it meant annihilation of the Protestants of Ireland. The acceptance of separate treatment for Ulster would mean betrayal of their brethren scattered through the other three provinces, while to flee the land would excite only the indignation cry, "Add not to your cruel hate your yet more cruel love."

MARRIAGE LAW.

With regard to the Marriage Law, the committee spoke with no uncertain voice relative to this question. They rejoiced in the continued agitation in the press and from the pulpit and platform for one marriage law. The carrying of the matter to the courts of law was deemed wise, for one wants to know the facts and whatever these facts might be to fight for one marriage law and that under the sole control of the Dominion. Canada and her civil interests must be protected independently of any religious views; therefore it was essential for the good of the community and its peace that marriages should be contracted under the sanction of a common law. The government and the voter should be true to Canada's best welfare and serve in this way to strengthen the Imperial ties.

NE TEMERE DECREE.

Concerning the Ne Temere Decree, the committee noted that the situation with regard to this infamous decree had considerably changed since the last meeting of the Most Worshipful Grand Chapter. The discussion in the Hebert case having been reversed and it having been decided that the Ne Temere Decree had no civil force in the Province of Quebec which decision practically concedes the fact that it has no civil force anywhere in the Dominion. If the Supreme Court of Canada and the Privy Council in the case that is now pending, should render their decision in favor of the Federal parliament having power under the constitution to pass a uniform marriage law, then the Order must press for the passing of such a law at the earliest possible moment; but should the Privy Council decide otherwise, then the agitation must be kept up until the British North America Act should be amended so as to provide for the passage of such a law.

"In the meantime," said the report "we believe that provision should be made whereby any priest or layman who attempts to separate a couple married in accordance with the civil law should be treated the same as any other law-breaker, and be made amenable to criminal punishment. Let us ever keep in view the bringing about of that glorious consummation when there shall be no special privilege in our fair Dominion and every citizen, no matter what his creed, shall enjoy equal rights and British fair play."

MOTU PROPRIA.

Discussing the matter of Motu Propria the report stated that this was carrying us back to the Norman days of England and we feel now as then, that the old rule laid down by Queen Elizabeth is safe—"The Bishop of Rome has no jurisdiction in these realms."

SEPARATE SCHOOLS.

The report discussing separate and bilingual schools stated that the conditions which prevail today and are likely to exist in the future make it desirable that no privileges be granted any religious body which will discriminate against the others or tend to divide the community or hinder its growth as one people. This applies to what are known as separate schools and to bilingual schools. Canada is a young country with a splendid future before it and the elements for success demand that she be free from any ties which favor the influence of the ultramontane Bishop of Rome, who is not a Canadian or a person responsible for the well-being of Canada.

TO CELEBRATE A CENTURY OF PEACE

Ottawa, 30th April, 1912

My Dear Sir: You may be aware that, last year, a National Committee was formed in New York, looking towards a joint celebration by Great Britain and the United States of a Century of Peace among English speaking peoples, and that, recently, a similar movement has taken place in the United Kingdom, and an Association has been organized under the able and zealous chairmanship of our late Governor General, Lord Grey.

This Century of Peace will have been completed on the One Hundredth anniversary of the Treaty of Ghent, which was concluded on Christmas Day, 1814, and ratified on the 17th of February, 1815. It naturally possesses a special interest for Canadians, inasmuch as Canada is immediately adjacent to the United States, and is the portion of the British Empire that witnessed the actual conflicts of the war of 1812-14. The bitterness engendered by those feuds has happily long since passed away, and it seems fitting that we should participate in celebrating the blessings of peace which for a period of one hundred years will have existed between us and our neighbors. It is not quite apparent to what extent this movement has taken concrete form in the United States, but the favorable manner in which the proposal has been received here, as evidenced by the representative character of the National Committee, and the enthusiasm with which the idea has been taken up by our friends in Great Britain, indicates that the time has arrived when some tentative step may with propriety be taken by Canada.

Realizing that upon occasions of this character someone must be prepared to assume the initiative, we, at the request of many of those interested, have undertaken to send an invitation to a number of representative Canadians to meet at Ottawa on Tuesday, the 4th of June next, at 11 a.m., in the Railway Committee Room of the House of Commons, for the purpose of having an interchange of views upon this subject in its various aspects, and of forming, if deemed advisable, a Canadian National Association or Committee to co-operate with the Committees in Great Britain and the United States for the purpose of furthering this joint celebration.

We earnestly hope that you may find it convenient to attend this meeting and would ask you to kindly send a reply to George Burn, Esq., General Manager of the Bank of Ottawa, Ottawa; and if, unfortunately, you are unable to be present, we shall be glad if you will state your views regarding the proposed Peace Celebration and whether you are willing to give your assistance to an Association, if one is formed for that purpose.

KENTUCKY KNIGHTS TEMLAR

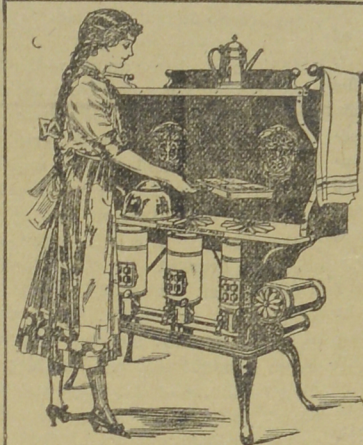

of all, of course, will be the banquet to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, at the Windsor next Wednesday, when the might and flower of Canadian Liberalism will gather to honor the revered chief of the party. And it will be strange if an inspiration does not go forth from that assembly to stimulate the party to greater efforts and greater conquests in every part of the Dominion.

Mr. Napoleon Seguin, who won such a notable victory in St. Mary's division, is also to be feted by the Liberal clubs in that division, and the Hon. J. L. DeCarie was honored with a banquet last Saturday night, and other celebrations have been or are about to be held.

Mr. Leon Garneau, the new president of the Montreal Reform Club, said at the annual meeting last night that although the Liberal party happened to be in opposition at Ottawa, just at present it was not quite dead yet. The spirit and enthusiasm of the meeting amply bore out his words. The first steps were also taken to largely increase the membership of the club by a campaign to bring in young men, and by providing special meetings for their benefit where they will hear addresses on suitable subjects and exercise their talents in debate. It was also predicted that the next annual meeting would be held in the new club house for which the charter has lately been secured.

The fact that every candidate in the recent elections who was assisted by the Hon. Messrs. Monk, Pelletier and Mantel, had gone down to defeat was referred to by one of the speakers, and this was taken as an indication of what would happen at the next federal elections.

Some of the Conservative papers outside the province are strenuously endeavoring to show that the Liberal victory in Quebec had only a local significance, but their protestations are considered as indicating an inner feeling that does not quite agree with their words.
