"to our brethren and Sir Knights the admonition of our Grand Master to 'keep fighting until One School, One Flag and One Language for the whole Dominion be an accomplished fact.'"

USE OF FLAG.

"We believe that with few exceptions respectful recognition is accorded the Red Cross symbol of British Unity and Liberty throughout the length and breadth of our beloved land but we feel that it will never be regarded as the object of endearment to which its noble traditions entitle it by the incoming millions of different races and creeds until it floats over every school-house in the land as the symbol of a free and unsectarian education in the English language. We rejoice to know that in this province at least, that ideal is being reached, thanks for which are due its pioneer statesmen who secured for it the boon of provincial autonomy in educational affairs."

HON. A. B. MORINE STILL ON THE JOB

The Herald like many others was a good deal astonished the other day to learn that the public service Commission was here on its official business, and that the chairman, Mr. Morine was still with it. No doubt as the facts show, we were all wrong about it, but didn't a good many people get the idea that Mr. Morine had retired from the Commission? He was made just before the House closed the object of a rather drastic criticism by Mr. Carvell, a Liberal member. The gist of Mr. Carvell's indictment was that when in Newfoundland politics Mr. Morine had been an advisor of the Crown and a leader of the Legislature which made over to the Reids about everything that was of much value in the island and at the same time in the pay of the Reids as their legal adviser. Mr. Morine in his reply to Mr. Carvell conceded the facts but held to the view that there was no harm. There was a hubbub. Mr. Borden solemnly avowed his intention of studying the question and making known his decision about the fitness of Mr. Morine and Mr. Morine was reported to have decided that on the whole the best thing would be for him to get out. Everybody else thought so too.

And now Mr. Morine bobs up just as if nothing had happened. Who is responsible for the change of attitude? Is it himself, or is it Mr. Borden, or who is it? Really, it is disconcerting to see people who were thought to be gone and done acting in utter unconsciousness of what is expected of them.

Soulanges—O. Mousseau, Liberal, majority 132.

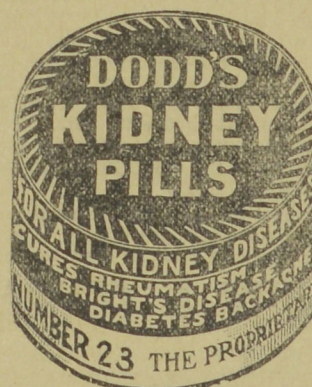
Rimouski—A. Tessier, Liberal, majority 182.
