ganizing a New Brunswick regiment for foreign service.

An order-in-council was passed recommending that in future all parties contracting for work with the provincial government should, as far as possible, use New Brunswick coal.

For some time the government has been in communication with the dominion government in regard to having the United States embargo on New Brunswick potatoes repealed, and word has been recently received at Ottawa through the British embassy at Washington, stating that a decision will be reached in the course of a few days. The government is hopeful that its efforts will be successful. Negotiations are being carried on with the Bermuda authorities with a view of having the embargo on New Brunswick potatoes removed by that country.

CABINET SHUFFLE HELD UP BECAUSE OF DISSENSIONS

Ottawa, Oct. 15.—The cabinet shuffle has been postponed. Hon. T. Chase Casgrain, after lingering in Ottawa for two days, has returned to Montreal. Hon. L. P. Pelletier has reconsidered his decision to retire. Hon. Bruno Nantel is showing reluctance about leaving his office. The changes are promised for tomorrow without fail, but people are beginning to think that the re-organization of the administration is off indefinitely. It has come out that Hon. Robert Rogers is responsible for the proposed cabinet changes. He desired to strengthen the Quebec wing of the government as a preliminary step to the general election for which he has been pressing. It was he who decided that Hon. Mr. Casgrain and Mr. E. L. Patenaude should go into the government and Hon. L. P. Pelletier and Hon. Bruno Nantel should go out.

It was not Sir Robert Borden, but Hon. Robert Rogers who served notice on Mr. Pelletier and Mr. Nantel that their resignation from the administration was desired. Mr. Nantel demurred from the first but, it is said, finally promised Mr. Rogers to exchange his portfolio for a railway commissionership.

Hon. Mr. Pelletier was first persuaded to resign. He was given to understand that he would be succeeded by Mr. Arthur Sevigny of Dorchester, and that there would be a general election and his health was not good enough to carry him through a campaign.

When Hon. Mr. Pelletier learned that the election depended largely on his resignation, and that he was to be succeeded, not by Mr. Sevigny, but by Hon. Mr. Casgrain, he rebelled. The postmaster general does not see the need for a general election at the present time and can see no reason why he should be required to leave the administration the instant his health fails, when Hon. Dr. Roche has been given two years in which to recover. However, the main objection which Mr. Pelletier has to leaving the government is that Mr. Casgrain would succeed him.

Mr. Pelletier and Mr. Casgrain were fellow-members of the Quebec government under Premier Flynn and there they acquired a mutual hatred which has persisted for twenty years.

Hon. Mr. Casgrain vowed that he would never again be associated with Mr. Pelletier. That he has not changed his view is shown by the fact that because Mr. Pelletier was taken in at the formation of the Borden government Mr. Casgrain refused to enter. He was offered a cabinet place when Hon. Mr. Monk resigned, and again refused for the same reason.

Today he refuses to join Sir Robert Borden until Mr. Pelletier is put out, and Mr. Pelletier reciprocates by refusing to resign if Mr. Casgrain is to be brought in.

Mr. Casgrain could enter at once as successor to Mr. Nantel, but he refused to do so because it would entail association with Mr. Pelletier and sharing with him the responsibility of administration. Hon. Mr. Rogers is still busy trying to straighten the tangle.

BRITISH M. P. SHOT BY A TURK

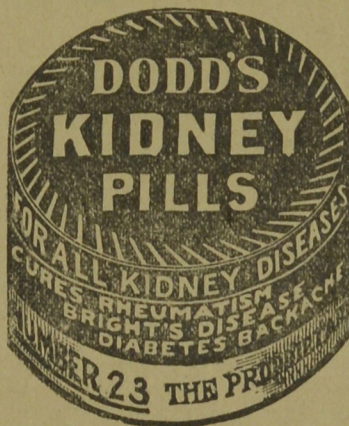
London, Oct. 16.—A despatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Bucharest says:

Noel Buxton (member of the British Parliament for North Norfolk) and his brother, Charles Roden Buxton, sons of Sir Thomas Buxton, former governor of South Australia, who had been in Bulgaria to confer with Bulgarian politicians regarding Bulgaria's attitude toward the European war, were both shot today by a young Turk, Pachel Hassan.

The Buxtons were travelling in an automobile with a son of M. Gurechhoff, former Bulgarian premier, to attend the funeral of the King of Roumania, when Pachel fired four shots at the party from a revolver. One of the Buxtons was shot through the lung. The other was only slightly wounded.

The assassin was arrested, he had just arrived from Salonica.

The correspondent says it is believed the wound of neither man is dangerous. He does not say which of the brothers was shot through the lung.
