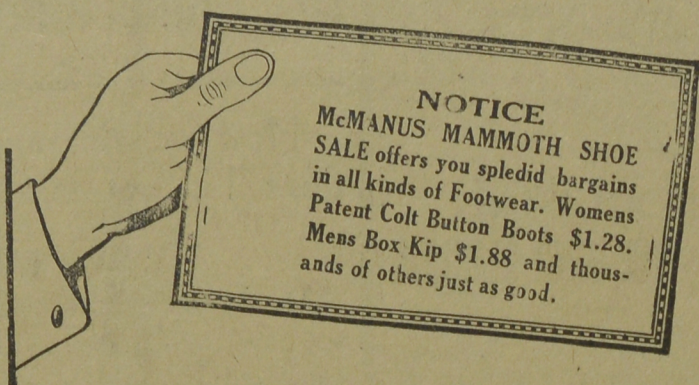
### WOMAN SHOT MOOSE.

## PULP WOOD MAY BE EXPORTED TO GREAT BRITAIN

Local Government Has Suspended the Regulations Which Prohibited Its Export--Will Transport Goods to Belgians--Other Matters

The local government finished its session on Friday, after putting through a large amount of important business.

Questioned in regard to the report of Commissioner Chandler on the St. John chief of police, Acting Premier Clarke stated that he had not yet received a copy of the evidence, and until that was forthcoming the report will not be given to the public.

In regard to the report of the royal commission on the Dugal charges, he stated that it had not yet been laid before the government, and he was not in a position to state when it would be.

The government, he said, had arranged for the transportation of any contributions made by the people of New Brunswick to the Belgian sufferers. Arrangements have been made by the Intercolonial and Canadian Pacific Railways to transport supplies free of charge to the point of shipment. The government has also arranged with St. John parties to provide frost-proof warehouses for the storage of goods intended for the Belgians.

The government has now in transit to Halifax fifteen thousand bushels of potatoes for the Belgians. This is in addition to the one hundred thousand bushels donated to the imperial government.

In view of advice received from the militia department, Hon. Mr. Clarke said, it was decided to make no contribution towards the expense of or

## HEARTY RESPONSE TO CALL FOR AID TO HEROIC BELGIANS

Immense Quantity of Clothing to go Forward From Here--Proceeds From Sale of Holstein Bull Goes Into Fund

Roland Ward, aged five years, and Kathleen Ward, aged seven years, visited the Belgian Relief Committee's headquarters on Queen Street, this morning and contributed the sum of fifty cents towards rendering assistance to the Belgian sufferers. The children told the members of the King's daughters, in charge of the work, that they had not spent any money for candy since the commencement of the war, and instead had saved up their pennies for the poor people of Belgium.

The work of packing the enormous quantity of boots, shoes and wearing apparel, which has been contributed by the people of Fredericton, was commenced last evening by J. J. Weddall & Sons and members of his staff, who volunteered their services, and between twenty and thirty cases are now ready for shipment. The committee announced to day that further contributions will be received at the relief headquarters every day next week.
