## BUDGET EXPECTED TO SHOW LARGE DEFICIT

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The financial statement for the month of January, as issued today by the Finance Department, is a record-breaking one with the record on the wrong side of the account.

The difference between falling revenues and increased expenditures was never more marked in the history of Canada. During the month the net debt of the Dominion increased by \$10,821,765 and now stands at \$314,383,870.

The revenue for January decreased by nearly \$2,000,000, while expenditures increased by over \$4,000,000 as compared with January last year.

The decrease in customs revenue last month was a little over \$2,000,000, or nearly 25 per cent. and indications are that monthly decreases will be the rule for some time to come.

For the first ten months of the fiscal year the total revenue has been \$139,101,515, an increase of \$1,081,580 over the first ten months of the preceding fiscal year.

Expenditure on consolidated fund account has totalled \$93,088,371, an increase of \$10,437,047 for the expenses of carrying on the ordinary administration.

Expenditure on capital account has totalled \$45,476,063, an increase over the corresponding period of 1913 of \$21,234,278.

Railway subsidies for the ten months totalled \$18,023,149, or \$13,382,049 more than for the corresponding ten months of the last fiscal year the increase being largely due to the \$15,000,000 voted to the Canadian Northern last session.

Indications now are that the total revenue for the complete fiscal year will fall a little below that of last year, namely, \$168,689,903, while total expenditures will probably run up to about \$184,000,000 or an increase of approximately \$40,000,000.

It is stated that owing to the continued illness of Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance, Hon. George E.

Foster will be called upon this year to deliver the budget speech. It will be a familiar role for him to announce a substantial increase in the public debt, but at the same time it is rather hard luck to ask him to shoulder the explanations of the minister of finance, who is properly responsible for the extravagant expenditures, which Mr. Foster deplors.

### Sawdust Bread

There is a bakery in Germany that turns out 20,000 loaves of sawdust bread daily and finds a ready market for this output. Although this "wooden bread" is intended for consumption for horses only, it is claimed by the manufacturer that in case of famine it would furnish a nutritious and highly satisfactory food for human beings. The sawdust is first subjected to a process of fermentation and various chemical manipulation, and is mixed with one-third part of rye flour. It is then formed into loaves and baked in an oven like any other bread.

### VALUE OF MAN'S SIZE

Modern Achievements Would be impossible to Tiny Men

He could not even produce great heat, because the external surface of his furnace would be so large in proportion to their volume that most of the heat would be lost. This would cut him off from all the chemistry that involves high temperatures, and therefore from metallurgy and mechanics.

### LOBSTERS IN NOVA SCOTIA

Coves at Canso Yield This Delicacy Even to Amateur Fishermen

It is estimated that the annual catch of lobsters in the world is 125,000,000, and of this Nova Scotia supplies 40,000,000, valued at \$2,000,000. The lobster pack that comes from anywhere else than this part of Canada is almost negligible. The lobster fishing has been well maintained of late, thanks to the help of the lobster hatcheries, which are placing in the sea millions of small lobsters yearly. It is still possible at Canso, Nova Scotia, as it is at but few places in the world, for an amateur to watch the lobsters crawling on bottoms of sheltered coves, and fishing them up, carry them home for supper, confident that they will have fresh boiled lobsters. Nova Scotia has a genuine monopoly of the English trade in the supplying of canned lobsters.

To bake potatoes quickly boil them in salted water for ten minutes, then put them in the oven. The boiling water will heat them through and they will cook in a short time.

### The Drain on Scotland

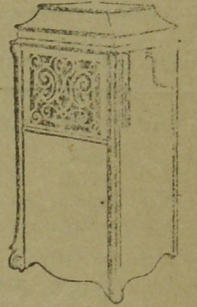
