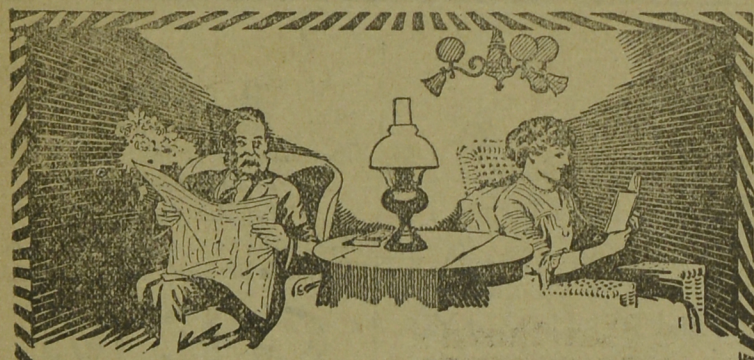

The dates for the games to be played by the Fredericton team, on the North Shore this week have been changed from the 11th and 12th to the 12 and 13th. A change has also been made in the order of the games. Fredericton will go through to Campbellton and play there first on Thursday night. On their return home they will play Chatham Friday night. This will give the team a better chance to defeat Campbellton. A win for Fredericton at Campbellton will give both the locals and Chatham a better chance for the honors. If Fredericton loses to the Restigouche team Campbellton wins the league except in the event of Chatham winning all or two of the three games that team is yet to play. If Fredericton loses at Campbellton and loses at Chatham chances for a three-cornered tie will be good.

FRED WADE SHOWED UP WELL FRIDAY NIGHT

Marysville Man was Given Good Chance with New Glasgow Black Foxes—Played Two Periods and Helped to Run up Big Score Against Halifax Socials

The Halifax Chronicle in its account of Friday night's game between the Halifax Socials and New Glasgow Black Foxes, in which New Glasgow was victorious by a score of 20 to 6 says that Fred Wade "was in the game for two periods and made a good showing helping the tally." Wade played with Marysville the past few seasons and was considered one of the best defence men ever turned out by that town. He is a clever stick-handler and although not a "speed skater" has a fair amount of speed. He is especially strong in breaking up combination play and has a wicked shot. When he first joined the Black Foxes it is reported he was not given a fair show but when they saw that he was there to stay he was given a better chance to make good.

He was in the game longer Friday night than any previous time since his appearance and it looks as though he is going to stick. "It's hard to keep a good man down." Belliveau of Moncton who played here with the Chatham team last season and is now playing with the Halifax Crescents, is also making good. He was the star of the Chatham team here in their games with Fredericton and Marysville and is a good all-round hockey player. Clayton Fréchette who is with the Fredericton club for the rest of the season says that on several occasions during the time he played with the Socials, Belliveau replaced a player and scored a tally which goes a long way towards the success of a young player.

HORSE RACING ON THE PACIFIC COAST

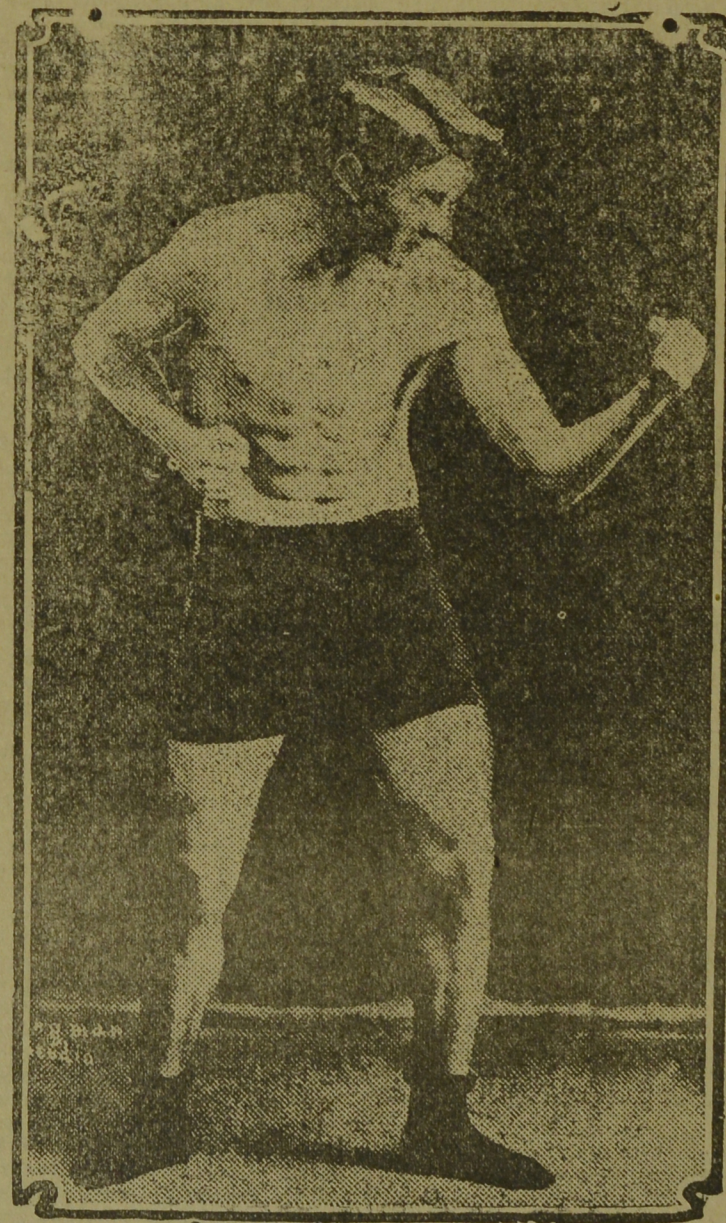
