## SWIMMERS TO COM- PETE IN HAWAII

San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 3.—In order to ascertain to their own satisfaction whether the Hawaiians really possess the supremacy in aquatic sports with which they are generally credited, a team of the speediest swimmers of San Francisco and vicinity sailed today for Honolulu to try conclusions with the Sandwich Islands in their own waters. The competitions will take place in Honolulu at the end of this month and will include events at from fifty to eight hundred and eighty yards and also a series of relay races.

### A PECULIAR DELICACY

Among many strange foods which the inhabitants of this world partake of, and consider delicacies, perhaps the strangest of all is earth. Yet there are tribes, the Lastians of Sam, who actually eat and enjoy earth. It has never been discovered where these peculiar people contract the habit, though it is generally believed that it probably came about in the time of a famine when there was nothing else to be had. However, the habit got such a hold upon them that, old and young, rich and poor, alike indulge freely in its consumption.

It is preferred when it has been obtained from the vicinity of waters so that it carries with it a taste of fish. It is made into a pasty substance and smothered into the ground in a hot fire. It can be obtained at markets and at stores, and is served at dinners and at big functions of any description. In some parts of the Congo earth is sold in the shape of apples and oranges, and is given out in various colors—yellow, brown, grey, and even pink, which is looked upon as a very delectable luxury.

### Commission on Treasure

When operations are carried on for the recovery of treasure at great depths divers are usually paid weekly wages, plus a commission on the value of the stuff actually recovered. One has received as much as \$50 in wages alone, and a diver has brought up in his hand a "find" worth no less than \$35,000. This was a hunting-knife studded with diamonds, and it was recovered from the "Cadiz," which was wrecked near Ushant, on the French coast.

## SIGNALS FROM AEROPLANES BY USE OF SOOT

Paris, Feb. 4.—An ingenious method which a French firm has invented for signalling from aeroplanes is attracting much attention, particularly in military circles. The device consists of a tube placed in such a position that a strong current of air from the propeller passes through it and is connected by a valve with a reservoir filled with soot. This valve can be operated by the passenger in the aeroplane in such a manner as to release either a large or a small quantity of soot from the reservoir into the tube. The soot whirled out of the tube by the draught forms in the wake of the machine in long or short streaks of black, by means of which messages can be given in the Morse code. It is stated that during the course of some experiments made with this device the dots and dashes of a message were made out with the help of powerful field-glasses over five miles away. The whole apparatus weighs not more than nine pounds.

### COAL IN CANADA

Nova Scotia Leads in Output of This Mineral Production

Coal is by far the most important product of the Canadian mines, as the value of the yearly output of coals and lignites reaches thirty-five per cent. of the total value of the country's mineral production.

Coal is abundant and extensively worked on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, and its occurrence greatly facilitates over-sea trade and local traffic on both oceans.

Canada's production of coal in 1908 reached nearly 11,000,000 tons; whereas in 1886 it was only slightly over 2,000,000 tons. This is a very significant fact, for to a great extent the consumption and production of coal furnishes a measure by which to judge of the development of a country. In this connection it must be remembered that Canada consumes about as much imported coal as it does of domestic product.

From the Nova Scotia fields is produced about three-fifths of Canada's total coal production. The main centres of production are in Cape Breton in Cumberland, in Pictou and in Inverness counties, in all of which are very extensive collieries.

In 1908 the total Canadian production of 11,000,000 tons Nova Scotia contributed 6,540,000 tons.

## FLORIDA D. A. R. MEETS

Orlando, Fla., Feb. 3.—A large attendance marked the opening here today of the twelfth annual state conference of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The opening session was held this morning, with Mrs. Glenville C. Frissell, state regent, presiding. The conference will conclude tomorrow.

### A Mounted Policeman Found Many of These in the Far North

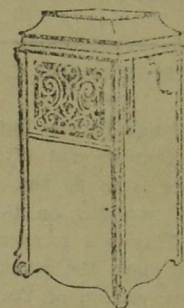
