Ald. Hoben moved to amend the bylaw relating to the Fire Department so as to permit of the paying of firemen's salaries in a lump sum to the captains of each company.

QUESTION OF TREES.

The petition presented by the Women's Institute respecting protection of the shade-trees of the city was received and read.

Speaking to this Ald. Mitchell said the matter was one of importance. The petition urged that the trees should be put under the care of the Forestry Department of the U.N.B. The suggestion was an excellent one if it could be worked. There was no doubt that inexperienced persons had injured trees in the past while attempting to prune and trim them. There also was the question of interfering with the work of the Local Improvement Association, a body which had done much good work. He suggested that a special committee be appointed to take up the matter.

The committee is composed of the mayor, Ald. Mitchell, Ald. Weddall, Ald. Everett, Ald. Farrell.

OPERA HOUSE MATTERS.

Ald. Mitchell moved, seconded by Ald. Rogers, that the report of the City Electrician on the matter of rewiring the City Opera House be referred to the City Hall Committee with power to act.

In amendment, Ald. Farrell moved that the estimate of the City Electrician be accepted and that the City Hall Committee and the manager of the City Opera House be empowered to make the repairs deemed necessary.

The amendment was not seconded. Ald. Mitchell said that he was not surprised that there was no seconder. The amendment was practically the same as the motion. Ald. Farrell was merely taking another crack at him. He pressed for his motion.

Ald. Farrell maintained that his amendment was the motion unanimously passed in committee the night before.

The motion was carried. The school accounts and the report of the Wilmot Park Trustees were received and ordered printed in the City Blue Book.

On the motion of Ald. Mitchell, H. C. Mackey and J. Arthur Thompson were appointed assistant assessors for the current year at the same salary.

CORN SHOW AT DALLAS READY FOR OPENING

Dallas, Texas, Feb. 4—All arrangements are practically completed for the opening of the sixth National Corn Show in this city next week. The exhibits already in place give assurance that the exhibition will be the largest and most representative of its kind that has ever been held in the United States. Though corn and corn products will form the bulk of the exhibits there will be interesting displays of many other varieties of farm products.

A majority of the states have responded to the invitation to make exhibits at the show. Practically every state of the south and middle west will have displays. Many of the states of the far west will be represented for the first time. Idaho will be represented with a wool display and Wyoming will show some methods of dry farming that were originated in that state. California will exhibit some of her choicest products of the garden, orchard and vineyard, and Arizona, Nevada and Utah will show the wonderful results accomplished by irrigation.

MAINE PROGRESS-

IVES ACTIVE

Portland, Me., Feb. 4—The members of the Progressive state committee of Maine are rounding up here for a meeting tomorrow, when a date will be fixed for the state convention and other plans discussed for the coming state campaign. By getting into the field and waging a vigorous campaign the leaders believe that their party will make an even better showing at the polls this year than it did in the election in November, 1912, when Maine returned 48,493 votes for Roosevelt as against 26,545 for Taft. The party has already decided to nominate complete state, congressional and county tickets this year.

"That, other things being equal, the government prefers to have purchases made from its friends and not its enemies. We would expect to make purchases from our friends provided that there was no conflict with the public interest in doing so."

"The public interest has already suffered because of the patronage system under this government," said Mr. MacLean, "and we shall give some instances before the session closes. Some rule should be laid down," he went on, "as to when favor should be shown friends of the government."

Nova Scotia members draw attention to the fact that during the 1911 campaign Mr. Borden pledged himself to make some arrangement whereby fishermen would be supplied with free medicine.

"Is this pledge being carried out?" they asked.

"The matter is being investigated," Mr. Hazen replied, "but it is difficult to handle. However, I have not despaired yet of being able to do something."

GASLIGHT CO. OFFERS

RATE FOR STREET LIGHTING

Committee Will Consider Matter--

Rate of 3 1-2 Cents Per Kilo-watt Hour Offered

The Fredericton Gaslight Company have made an offer to the city authorities to deliver electric current at the city power-house, Carleton Street, at the rate of 3 1/2 cents per Kilo-Watt hour. The offer was read before the city council by Ald. Rogers, chairman of the Street Lighting Committee last night. On the vote of the Council the matter was referred to the Street Lighting Committee.

The electric current of the Gaslight Company is 60-cycle at a 2300 voltage. Should the city accept the offer apparatus would have to be installed to transform the current to the voltage required for the street lighting service.

The Fredericton Gaslight Company claims that at the rate it has offered the city the streets can be lighted at a cost so much lower than the present cost that the interest on the Street Lighting bonds can be paid and a saving of about \$200 a year be made in addition. Engineer F.A. Barbour of Boston in a report recently prepared for the City Council recommended that any offer to furnish current at the rate of 3 1/2 cents per Kilo-watt per hour should receive consideration.

HEARINGS ON STOCK

EXCHANGE BILL

Washington, D.C., Feb. 4—Public hearings in the Owen bill to prohibit the use of the mails and telegraph and telephone lines in furtherance of fraudulent and harmful transactions on stock exchanges have begun today before the Senate Banking Committee. Representatives of the New York Stock Exchange, at which the bill is aimed, have announced their intention of appearing before the committee to speak in opposition to the measure. Delegations from the grain exchanges in Chicago, Milwaukee, Minneapolis and other cities also will be heard.

Winter Stores in Labrador

The Indians of the barren lands of Labrador rely almost entirely upon the migrating caribou for winter sustenance. When the great herds of reindeer go south in the fall, the Indians lie in waiting for them, killing sufficient meat to keep them from starvation during the months of darkness and desolation. The meat, as killed, is packed into caches—either high in the trees, well out of reach of wolves, or in some natural cave, which is barricaded with rocks and timber. When the last deer have south, the barren lands are almost destitute of life, and should anything happen to their store the Indians are confronted with starvation.

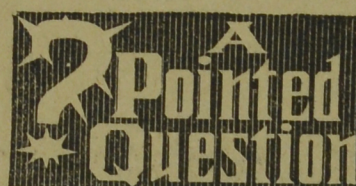

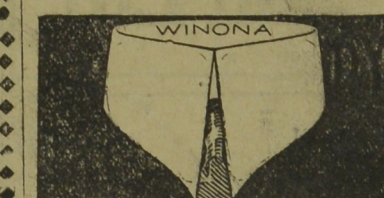
