Chatham, N.B., Feb. 3.—Chatham defeated Campbellton tonight in the greatest game seen on the local ice in years by a score of four to three, overtime being necessary to put the Miramichi team in first place in the N.B. League.

Over 1,000 people viewed the match, which throughout was very close and interesting. Chatham had the fastest, though highest team, and succeeded in breaking up Campbellton's combination work, while they kept boring in persistently. Frank Brown, of Moncton, refereed to the great satisfaction of all. The line-up:

In the first period no score was made for eighteen minutes then Duncan slashed in the first tally for Chatham from the face off near Campbellton's net. In the second period Chatham scored again and Fowler for Campbellton made it 2-1. In third period Chatham again scored Jones tallying in six minutes, and with the score 3-1 Campbellton put on steam with the result that the score was tied and for several minutes both teams battled without breaking the tie. At the end of the time the teams changed ends and continued the struggle, Cole having replaced Campbellton's star, Fowler who was hurt in collision. Within two minutes Jones scored for Chatham and the game ended 4 to 3. For Campbellton, Fowler and Mathews were stars on the forward line, while McLean showed up splendidly in goal. Chatham's defence was nearly impregnable, Rogers being at his best and Chisholm playing splendid defence and offensive game. All four forwards played consistent hockey and contributed to the victory.

St. John Athletic Club TeamScore Last Night was 13 to 1—College Team Looks
Pretty Good—Game Against Strong Team is
Needed However to Show up Red and Black's
Strength and Weakness—Forwards Were Fast—
Defence Strong

The U.N.B. hockey team last night defeated St. John by a score of 13 to 1. It was the first game which the U.N.B. team has played this season. They outclassed their opponents in every department of the game, which was an easy thing to do. St. John lacked team-work, having no combination at all. It was no test as to the strength or weakness of the U. N.B. team and could not be called a good exhibition of hockey.

MATERIAL LOOKS GOOD.

The Red and Black worked very well together and showed that they had the material to make a real hockey team if it is properly developed. With "Mike" Murphy as coach, the followers of the team expect to see one of the best teams which has ever represented the college. Van-Wart was to play goal but owing to a slight illness he was unable to play. Maimann played goal and although nervous at first steadied down and made some good stops. The only tally made on him was a long shot, waist high. Asker at point, looks to be the man for the position. He skates fast, stick-handles well and checks hard and often. Captain Melanson the cover, plays a steady game. He has a good long shot and uses it to good advantage. McLean at rover, is considered by all, as the best player ever wearing the Red and Black uniform. He carries the puck from end to end at will, seeming to find no trouble at all in scoring. He scored six of his team's goals on brilliant dashes down centre-ice and was indirectly responsible for at least two more. Hipwell at centre, played a very good game but with a real live centre marking him he would not have made the goals he did as he takes too much time getting the puck away. Pugh plays his position on the wing in fine style. Although the lightest man on the team, he gives and takes his "bumps" and is always ready to get in on the net. Oldham on the other wing, did not show up as well as was expected. He skates fast and checks hard but has a tendency to over-ski the puck. Edington played good hockey during the short periods he was on the ice. He is not especially good in any one department but is a good all-round player.

ST. JOHN VERY WEAK.

The St. John team hadn't a star. Finley lead the contingent as the leading "goal-getter," scoring one lone tally. Although one goal has won many games, it would have taken a dozen and one to tie in that game.

THE GAME.

Hipwell scored on a pass from Pugh after two minutes of play. McLean put the team two goals in the lead a minute later after a short rush. He was put off three minutes for knee-checking Finley on the next play, and O'Leary three minutes for tripping Pugh. Finley carried the puck from behind his net and took a shot from near centre-ice and scored St. John's only "goal." The game was fairly even for a while. Quirt made some fine stops as did Maimann. Pugh scored the last goal of the half by boring in on the net after twenty minutes of play. The half ended 3 to 1 in favor of the college boys.

SECOND HALF.

Oldham replaced Edington at wing and started out well, scoring after one minute of play. Pugh followed the lead and scored a minute later. O'Leary and Oldham were penalized three minutes for mixing it up. McLean scored his second goal after fourteen minutes of play. McNeil was penalized three minutes for tripping McLean and Clark five minutes for back-checking Asker. Hipwell and McLean both scored alternately. The St. John defence was up in the air and gave the college boys any amount of chances to score. Pugh and McLean both scored, Edington, who replaced Oldham, scored on a pass from Melanson and McLean made the final goal during the last minute of play. The game ended 13 to 1 in favor of U.N.B.

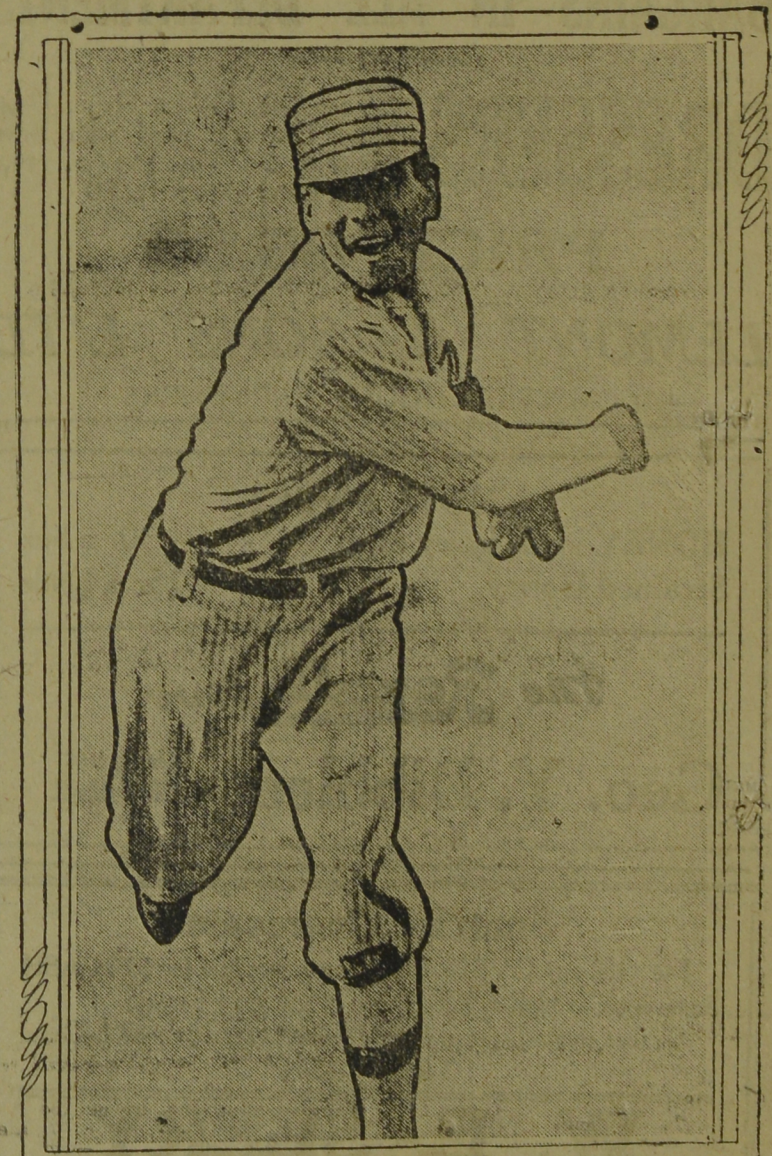
