MAGISTRATE AND MAYOR CLASHED IN POLICE COURT

Inadvisability of Making Third Offence
Conviction Caused Trouble—No
Proper Records of Previous
Convictions Available

Police Magistrate Limerick this morning clashed with His Worship Mayor Mitchell in the police court. The incident occurred in connection with the charge of violation of the Canada Temperance Act made against Long's Hotel. A third offense against the act was charged, but His Honor giving judgment, made a conviction for a first offense. This was because there are no proper records of previous convictions for first and second offenses against the accused. Without such proper records conviction for a third offense could not be made without the danger of an appeal upon excellent grounds.

Upon hearing the judgment of the court, His Worship, who was present, remarked that it was little use for a police commission to attempt to enforce the act under the circumstances. The magistrate took the remark as reflecting upon the court and informed the mayor that although chairman of the police commission and mayor of the city, he had no more right than any other person to make remarks in court. The magistrate declined to listen to any explanatory remarks from the mayor.

It is understood that His Worship had no intention of reflecting upon the court in making the remark he did.

R. B. Hanson, who appeared as counsel for the city, applied to His Honor for a jail-sentence instead of a fine for the first offense in which conviction had been made. His Honor replied that he would impose

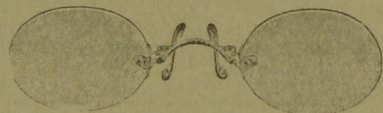

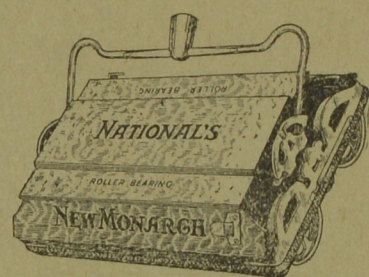
