with his regiment. Lieut. E. C. Shields of No. 1 (Brighton) Company, Canadian Engineers, also left this morning for Sussex to go into camp Q.M. Sergt. Instructor Hobkirk, attached to the 71st Regt. and some of the R.C.R.

There is great activity at the Armory preparatory to the departure of the troops. It is expected that the 71st Regt. will go in stronger than ever before. The headquarters staff and "D", "E" and "G" Companies will assemble at the Armory about seven o'clock tomorrow morning. The battalion will parade at nine a.m. and march to the I.C.R. station, where it will entrain, together with the 28th Dragoons. The train will leave at ten a.m. The baggage will be loaded at the I.R.C. freight-sheds tonight and will go out in a separate train early tomorrow morning. At McGivney Junction the two trains will be made into one and proceed over the National Transcontinental Railway via Moncton.

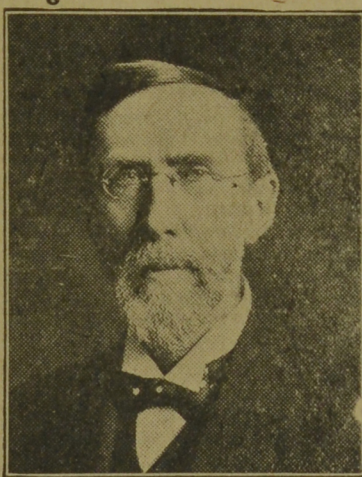
