WELL KNOWN LAWYER ILL

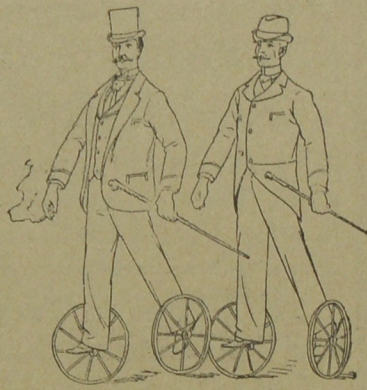

LOCAL GOVERNMENT WILL MEET HERE THIS EVENING

Problems Which Have Arisen in Connection With the Valley Railway Await Solution---Trouble Over Route to Andover

A meeting of the provincial government will be held here this evening to deal with several matters of considerable importance. Serious trouble has arisen over the route of the Valley Railway between Centreville and Andover, and the matter is causing the acting premier and his colleagues considerable annoyance. The Royalton route is favored by Mr. Gould and many others but it seems at the last election Mr. White, M.P. P., for Carleton, promised his constituents that the road would be built by the alternative route. He even went so far as to intimate to the government that if another route were chosen his resignation as a member of the legislature would be handed in forthwith. This is said to have been a factor in influencing the decision of the executive against the Royalton route. Now comes the report that Mr. Gould's company is strongly opposed to the route chosen by the government. They say that it will cost far more than it would to build by the Royalton route and if the government insists on it being followed, a larger bond guarantee will be necessary. It is said that Mr. Gould's company are anxious to make a raise on the bond guarantee of two million dollars put through last session, and Mr. Gould is expected here tonight to urge the matter upon the government. So many big problems await solution that the ordinary business of the government is not likely to receive much attention during the next few weeks.

ADVANCE PARTIES LEFT FOR SUSSEX THIS MORNING

Activity in Military Circles---71st Regt Will Leave by I. C. R. at Ten O'clock Tomorrow Morning---28th Dragoons Also

The advance party of the 71st York Regt. left for Sussex by C.P.R. this morning under the command of Major James Pringle, quartermaster. Hugh C. Titus of Marysville, is acting as quartermaster sergeant, Q.M. Sgt. Mercer having been called away last night by the serious illness of his wife and being prevented from attending camp. "A" Company of Marysville, "B" Company of Burd's Corner, and "D", "E" and "G" Companies of Fredericton, were represented by detachments on the advance party. An advance party from the local squadron of the 28th New Brunswick Dragoons also left for Sussex this morning.

Examinations at the Fredericton High School will delay the departure of several members of the signalling section of the 71st York Regt., who are taking final examinations at that school. Lieut. H. H. VanWart, who is in command of the signalling section, has arranged for several days' leave of absence for these signallers, who will write their examinations here and go into camp later in the week.

Lieut. T. R. McNally of "G" Company, 71st Regt., arrived from New York on Saturday and will leave for camp with the company tomorrow morning. Lieut. Jewett, A.M.S., of Keswick, medical officer of the 71st Regt., is also in the city today.

Lieut. James H. Sproul, 74th Regt., "Brunswick Rangers," left for Hampton this morning to go into camp.
