

WESTINGHOUSE ESTATE VALUED AT \$35,000,000

Pittsburg, March 18—Forty per cent of the residue of the estate to his widow, forty per cent to his son, and twenty per cent to his brother, were the principal bequests of Geo. Westinghouse, the noted inventor who died in New York last week. The will, a brief but complicated document of five paragraphs was probated here today.

The instrument gave no estimate of the value of the estate which however, is believed to be about \$35,000,000.

The will directed that his stock of the Westinghouse Air Brake Company should go to the widow and son two-thirds to the former and one-third to the latter.

A bequest of \$50,000 to Albert Gatden Uptegraff bequests equal to one year's salary to W. D. Uptegraff, H. C. Tener, M. K. Garrett and other men prominently identified with the Westinghouse enterprises, and bequests equal to one year's wage for each servant in the family service for five years or more, completed the will.

The will also provides that until the final disposition of the estate, by the executors, the son is to have an income of five hundred dollars a month and the widow is to receive the balance of the income from the estate during her life in monthly payments, of not less than ten thousand dollars and in event of the income being insufficient to pay this sum, the amount is to be made up from the principal.

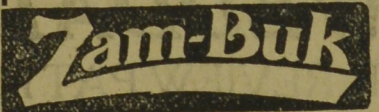

Sir,
I have to inform you that the tender for burnt timber on the Tobique Reserve on the south side of the river has been accepted, namely \$1.25 per M. feet, B. M., free of dues on condition that no green or partly green trees shall be cut and that sworn returns of measurements shall be furnished each season by an authorized scaler, cutter or surveyor, during the three years allowed for the removal of the timber, and that payments shall be made before the removal of the timber from the Reserve.

M. free of dues, and that no green trees or partly green trees were to be cut.
