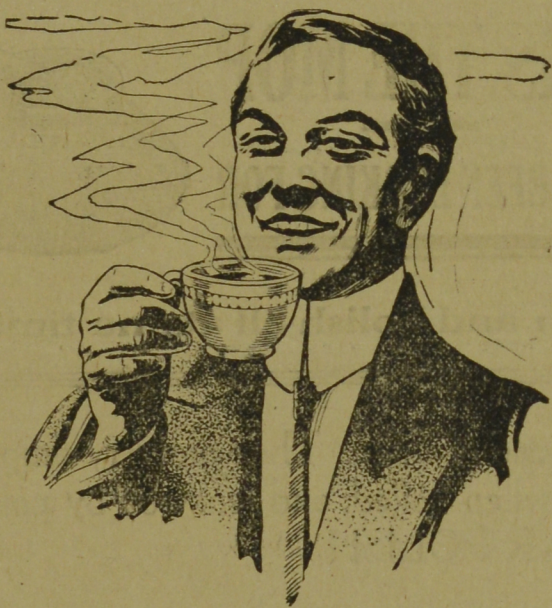

Maliseet Ind. Reservation.
Nov. 24th, 1913.

Dear Mr. Scott.

Just a few words to ask the Dept.
of Indian Affairs so appoint some
one to look after this reservation.
Last winter many things were far
from being right. As yet, there
has been no investigation.

This year things commenced earlier.
The Chief, as it is reported, gave
two white people permits to cut
logs on the reservation proper—that
is where we live. How the Chief
can do this we are at a loss. We
hear he received good sums of
money for these permits.

We spoke to the Indian agent. He
said he would write to the Depart-
ment. But he told the party to go
on yarding logs until he received
word from Ottawa. Now we want
this lumber seized, and the Chief
severely punished so that such will
not take place again.

TEXT OF SOLEMN ULSTER PLEDGE AND COVENANT

Inasmuch as we, the duly elected
delegates and members of the Ulster
Unionist Council, representing all
parts of Ulster, are firmly persuaded
that by no law can the right to govern
those whom we represent be bar-
tered away without their consent;
that, although the present govern-
ment, the services and sacrifices of
generations of our race have been
forgotten, may drive us forth from
this constitution which we have ever
loyally upheld, they may not deliver
us bound into the hands of our ene-
mies; and that it is incompetent for
any authority, party or people to
appoint as our rulers a government
dominated by men disloyal to the
empire and to whom our faith and
tradition are hateful;

And inasmuch as we reverently be-
lieve that, as in times past, it was
given our fathers to save themselves
from a like calamity, so now it may
be ordered that our deliverance shall
be by our own hands; to which end
it is needful that we be knit together
as one man, each strengthening the
other, and none holding back or
counting the cost;

Therefore we, loyalists of Ulster,
ratify and confirm the steps so far
taken by the special commission and
this day submitted and explained to
us, and we reappoint the commission
to carry on its work on our behalf as
in the past;

We enter into the solemn covenant
appended hereto, and, knowing the
greatness of the issue depending on
our faithfulness, we promise each to
the other that to the uttermost of
the strength and means given to us,
and not regarding any selfish or pri-
vate interest, our substance or our
lives, we will make good the said
solemn covenant.

And we now bind ourselves in the
steadfast determination that, what-
ever may befall, no such domination
shall be thrust upon us, and in the
hope that by the blessing of God our
union with Great Britain, upon which
are fixed our affections and trust, may
yet be maintained and that for this
province and for the whole of Ireland
peace, prosperity and civil and reli-
gious liberty may be secured under the
parliament of the United Kingdom
and of the King, whose faithful sub-
jects we are and will continue all our
days.

THE COVENANT.

The following is the text of the
covenant:

Being convinced in our conscience
that Home Rule would be disastrous
to the material wellbeing of Ulster,
as well as to the whole of Ireland,
subversive to our civil and religious
freedom, destructive to our citizen-
ship and perilous to the unity of the
empire.

We whose names are underwritten,
men of Ulster, loyal subjects to His
Gracious Majesty King George the
Fifth, humbly relying on the God,
whom our fathers in days of strife
and trial confidently trusted, hereby
pledge ourselves in solemn covenant
throughout this our time of threat-
ened calamity, to stand by one an-
other in defending for ourselves and
our children our cherished position of
equal citizenship in the United King-
dom and in using all the means that
may be found necessary to defeat the
present conspiracy to set up Home
Rule in Ireland.

In the event of such a parliament
being forced upon us, we solemnly
and mutually pledge ourselves to re-
fuse its authority, in sure confidence
that God will defend the right.

Hereto we subscribe our names and
further we individually declare that
we have not already signed this cov-
enant.
