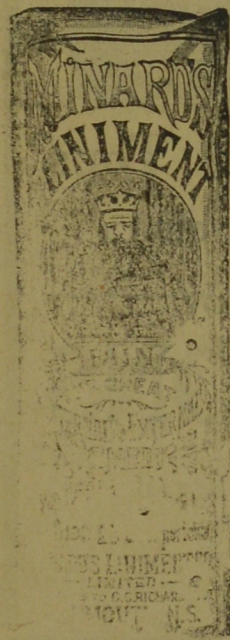

Women Surgeons Ignored the Shells

The London correspondent of The Medical Record describes in a letter the splendid work being done by British women surgeons in Antwerp. They proved to be absolutely fearless under fire. He also writes that epidemics of typhoid, dysentery and pneumonia have appeared among the German troops.

"The Army Medical Service has been doing a great work, as testified by combatant officers, who declare they have been supplied with clock-work regularity," the writer observes. "Correspondents declare that the organization throughout is so completely satisfactory that the French commissariat is closely studying it with a view of copying some of its methods, which are contrived to meet every eventuality. Unexpected changes in the movements of troops do not interrupt their supplies if need be.

TROOPS WELL FED.

"The Army Service Corps will take food up to the firing line, and well-fed troops are not likely to lose their nerve. The Germans, who plan to live on the country they invade, are said to have already suffered a good deal from deficiency. The British reserves and soldiers encamped for refitting get well-cooked meals of meat and vegetables, etc., just as if they were in barracks at home, and regiments on the march have 'army cookers' of the newest pattern, and so get hot soups or stews and are said, also, to take hot tea, regardless of the enemy's shells. Tobacco and cigarettes are looked upon as next to food, but we hear that a great desire for sweet things has developed among the men—chocolate and jam especially. This craving was strongly marked also in the last South African campaign.

"A hospital at Antwerp was organized by Mrs. Stobart and equipped by the Women's National Service League with a staff of twenty-eight women, six of whom were qualified doctors. Dr. Florence Stony says they proved that women surgeons were of use in war conditions, for when shells were screaming overhead and part of the roof of the hospital blown off, there was no sign of fear or panic, but all went about their work as orderly as if it were a picnic in the park. She made light of eighteen hours under shell fire, as not one of the patients was hurt, though the nerves of some of them were shattered.

"By advice of Lieut. Col. W. A. Sykes, I.M.S., six vessels are being fitted up as hospital ships for the Indian troops in the present war and some of the Indian princes propose to present others. Each will accommodate about three hundred and fifty patients, of which one hundred will be in swinging cots, (for the most serious cases) and the others in fixed iron bunks. Each ship is a complete

hospital. One has already left the docks in charge of Lieut. Col. Ginstle, late I.M.S., and another is just ready to start under Lieut. Col. Pratt, I.M.S.

"Returning to the danger of epidemics among troops, it seems already to have become realized on the German side, for this morning we have news of numerous cases of typhoid, dysentery and pneumonia having occurred. Prof. Besserer of Munster, having been sent to investigate and take measures against the outbreak, has made an unfavorable report and declared nothing else could be expected under the circumstances.

"It appears that soldiers had had to stay for five days and nights without a break in trenches that were flooded and in places half full of water and, still worse, during all that time no fresh provisions had reached them, with the natural result that what remained in their knapsacks became mouldy. Moreover, there was no possibility of moving the dead or wounded and though some improvement had followed a favorable change in the weather, the professor naively remarks that he could give no guarantee for the future."

INDIANS KILLED TURNKEY AND LEFT JAILOR INSENSIBLE

Pembroke, Ont., Nov. 29—Robert Coxford, turnkey of the Renfrew county jail here, was murdered and Wm. Brown, the jailor, lies at death's door as the result of a successful attempt at jailbreaking by two Indians, White Duck and Anthony Jocko, late this afternoon. The redskins were being held pending trial on a charge of theft from Grand Trunk freight cars at Golden Lake. Both got clean away, and the countryside is being scoured by armed posses of special constables and citizens in search of the desperadoes.

The Indians were in the corridor fronting the cells in the jail when Coxford entered with some supplies. The turnkey had occasion to enter a cupboard in the corridor and as soon as he had his back turned, one of the Indians came up with a chair and dealt him a smashing blow on the head, fracturing his skull. Death ensued in a few minutes.

JAILOR OVERPOWERED

Aroused by the sound of a fall, Jailor Brown rushed to the scene, seizing the first available weapon he could find, an iron poker. Inside the corridor the Indians were waiting, and Brown was soon overpowered and the poker wrested from him. He was beaten into insensibility with this implement, and the Indians, made their way through the corridor and escaped by the main entrance to the county buildings.

As soon as the alarm was raised, Sheriff Morris assumed charge of the operations, and many citizens volunteered to aid in the chase. Every road from the town was immediately placed under a strong guard, but up to a late hour tonight no trace had been found of the Indians.

GERMANY HAD PLANNED MARCH INTO BELGIUM

Chicago, Nov. 29—The retired German General Von Bernhardt, divulged the plans of Germany for the war which now is in progress at a secret meeting of three hundred Germans in San Francisco on May 26, 1913, according to a statement last night by Dr. J. A. Macdonald, editor of The Toronto Globe. Dr. Macdonald spoke at a reunion of the University of Toronto Alumni Association of Chicago.

Dr. Macdonald asserted that he had it from indisputable authority that Germany had long been preparing for the present war, and that in 1913 a retired General of the Prussian army had made a secret visit to the United States and informed prominent Germans of the detailed plans of the proposed attack, which, Von Bernhardt said, included an incursion into Belgium.

"The General outlined the exact number of days it would take to get to Paris, the cost and number of men necessary to get there, and said that when Paris had capitulated a levy would be made for its redemption," said Dr. Macdonald.

"After France had been captured the German army would overcome Russia. It was pointed out by the German officer that Great Britain was expected to remain neutral and that the time would shortly come when Great Britain would be attacked."

"This General is most reliably reported to have stated 'Law is a make shift force is the real weapon for strong nations.'"

Dr. Macdonald said he could not make public the name of his informant, but that he attended the meeting at which General Von Bernhardt is said to have revealed the general plans of the German attack.

ADMIT GETTING INFORMATION

San Francisco, Nov. 29—Local Germans, commenting today on the statement of Dr. J. A. Macdonald, editor of the Toronto Globe, in Chicago, that the retired German General Von Bernhardt, divulged German war plans while in secret conference with three hundred Germans here in 1913, declared there had been no private meeting.

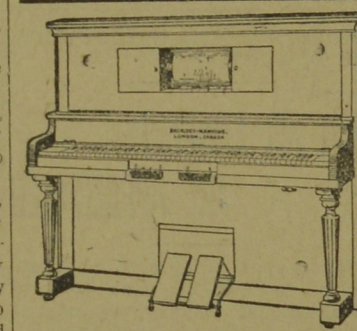
"He told us how the war would be conducted when it came," said one of the Germans. "It is all in his books, anyhow."
