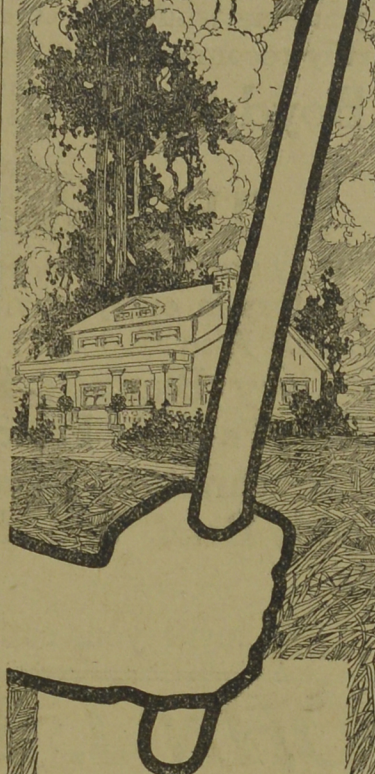

BEST STORIES OF THE WAR

Correspondents at the front or marooned in obscure places while the great European conflict rages manage daily to get through the wary censors some little grimly humorous or tragic sidelights of the war. Here are the best that have come over the cables or by mail recently:

THE MAN OF MYSTERY.

There is now a man in Strasburg to whose identity as much mystery attaches as to that of the man in the iron mask. He arrived wounded some days ago and was received reverentially by the military governor and other high officials.

At present he is accommodated in the palace, which is closely guarded. No servants are allowed to leave its precincts and even two doctors who are attending the mysterious patient have taken up their residence in the palace and are never seen outside.

The general impression at Strasburg is that the patient is the German crown prince.

"SKIN 'EM ALIVE!"

One of the latest orders of the Kaiser to his army indicates his anger and disappointment at his forces for holding back.

According to the Rotterdam Vossische Zeitung, the Kaiser recently visited his troops in the north of France. One soldier writes:

"He greeted everybody with 'good day, comrades' and we cheered in reply. Then he gave a short address and praised us for our bravery. He finished with the words:

"Skin the fellows wherever you meet them."

"Then we cheered again and the great moment was past."

CLOSE CALL FOR COOKIE.

"Lieut. B— of — regiment of infantry, holding Chamfleur, told me a few days ago that a cook of his company had only finished cooking dinner late at night," writes a correspondent. "The regimental wagons had gone astray and only joined the column after eight o'clock. When the meat had been prepared the cook started off, carrying it on a large grill a yard square. The cook lost his way in the darkness and after wandering about came across a trench.

"Is this the 6th Company?" he asked. To his astonishment the soldier he addressed rose to his feet and the cook saw that he wore a spiked helmet. The cook turned and ran for his life, followed by a storm of bullets. Strange to say, out of one hundred shots fired only one hit him, inflicting a slight wound on the left arm; but the cook brought back his grilled beef dinner intact, although cold.

"I had night after night heard the thunder of guns, but could not understand how the heavy artillery could do efficient work in the darkness, but shortly after dusk I found an explanation of the mystery. Two miles away, across the plain, a searchlight blazed out for thirty seconds and then disappeared. An instant later came

the flash of a big German gun. I watched the point on which the searchlight had been turned and then saw the flash of a bursting shell. Five minutes later the searchlight flashed from a new position. This manoeuvre was repeated time and again all along the horizon, searchlights flashing in every direction and the thunder of guns rolling down to Chamfleur."

"REMEMBER LOUVAIN!"

"Yesterday's fighting on the Belgian coast was exceptionally severe," writes a correspondent. "The Germans, who were in great strength, attacked with impetuosity. The German infantry flung themselves against two points, Nieupoort and Dixmude. The attacking column which sought to force its way past Nieupoort in the hope of gaining Furnes and the French frontier despite the heavy losses sustained in its first assault, returned to the attack three times. The engagement lasted the greater part of the day, but ultimately the Germans were driven back along the whole line.

"The Germans at first carried everything before them. The column which was attacking Dixmude succeeded in overwhelming the force posted there and in gaining possession of the town itself; but its triumph was short lived. A Belgian force swept it away with the bayonet, to the battle cry of 'Remember Louvain and Termonde.' Desperate hand to hand fighting took place. The Germans stood up to the oncoming line of levelled bayonets, but their resistance soon crumbled and they speedily yielded the ground they had won earlier in the fight. Once they began to retire, the bayonets accounted for large numbers and when the pursuing infantry halted from sheer fatigue, the artillery completed the work of demoralization which the much dreaded cold steel had begun."

Why not Kaiser Wilhelm von Turkey, von England, von Ireland, von Scotland, von Wales, von Channel Islands, von India and von New Zealand? While about it don't be niggardly.

The haste of Russia to forecast the result of the Turkish entry to the war is almost indecent. Says the Novoe Vremya: "Partition of Turkey is at last in sight." And as a partitioner Russia will show some fancy carving.

Crown Prince wounded again? That lad doesn't look robust and he is probably hampered in getting away from the bullets by the weight of iron crosses and things he is decorated with.
