Balkan presided over the gathering and those present were members of the football team: Coach Campbell, Manager Herbert Devasher, Cheer Leader Ewart Atkinson and Touch Judge Blaine Pugh. The U.N.B. FREDERICTON HIGH DEFEATED.  
St. John High School football team, champions of Interscholastic League, wound up their season here on Saturday without a defeat, winning over Fredericton High School by the narrow margin of 8 to 6. Fredericton High seemed to have the game pretty well sewed up when two pieces of bad judgment by Capt. TWO FIELD BATTERIES  
TO BE SENT FROM  
LOWER PROVINCES

Not Known Yet Whether One or Both  
Will be Mobilized in This City---  
Famous Regiments Here in  
The Past

The announcement on Saturday that the military authorities will mobilize the field artillery for the Second Overseas Contingent in Fredericton was very pleasing news to the people of this city. When the agitation was started a few days ago Mayor Mitchell, acting for the City Council, promptly took the matter up with the authorities at Ottawa and Halifax, and is naturally very much pleased over his work. There are to be two batteries of field artillery raised in the maritime provinces but whether or not both will be mobilized here has probably not yet been determined. The war strength of a field battery is 150 officers and men and about seventy-five horses and there is ample accommodation here for both batteries. The officers and men will likely be quartered at the barracks and the horses in the stalls at the exhibition building. As before pointed out, Fredericton has the only permanent barracks in the province. There are the officers' and men's barracks on Queen street and the park barracks on Regent street. The Queen street barracks were erected in 1828 and have almost continuously been occupied by regular troops. Many famous regiments, now doing heroic work on the firing-line in France and Belgium, were stationed in this city in the old days before Confederation. The last imperial troops to see service here was a company of the Berkshire Regiment, which occupied the barracks about seventeen years ago.

SUPREME COURT  
WILL OPEN HERE  
TOMORROW MORNING

Attorneys and Barristers to be Sworn  
in---Docket for the Term is Not

The November term of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court will open here tomorrow. The docket is a very light one and includes several appeals in criminal cases. Four candidates for attorneys-at-law, who passed the recent final bar examinations in this city, and one graduate of the King's College Law School at St. John, will be sworn in at eleven o'clock tomorrow morning and ten attorneys will be sworn in as barristers on the following Thursday.
