HIS LAST APPEAL

The Province of Ontario has had six prime ministers but the late Sir James Whitney was the first to die in office. Sir James' last public address was delivered at a monster public meeting in Massey Hall, Toronto, in June last, when he was appealing for re-election. Speaking with great emotion on that occasion, he said:

"I feel that my words are lame and halting, not equal to the task which I have in the past. And I thank you, my good friends, no matter what your political feelings may be, who have come here tonight, and with a heart filled to overflowing I say, may God bless you every one."

Commenting on the above The Toronto Globe, the chief Liberal organ, pays him this tribute:

"And now he is gone into that Dark Valley from the shadow of which he has recently emerged. Full of years—three score and ten—but until recently with almost no abatement of vigor full of honors, alike from the common people of his native province, from parliament in which his word was law and from his king, respected even by those who neither loved him or followed him, he has passed into the great beyond, his public career unspoiled by slow decline, his name unstained by dishonor or by the petty jealousies that haunt the steps of those who rise from low estate to high position."

GERMAN FINANCES

A recent issue of the Revue des deux Mondes, the great French review, contains a passage on the origin of the war which is worthy of attention. The future historian, it says, "will understand that the present war was a financial arrangement made on the eve of bankruptcy, as much as it was the result of megalomania or a craze for fighting. Financial Germany was in great difficulties, its colossal operations had always been unfortunate; it had schemed too much, risked too much, made too large advances in goods and money to customers of doubtful credit, both in Germany and throughout the world; it had accumulated its buyers to prices and transactions which did not leave the necessary profit to the manufacturer or to the German capitalist, and it was necessary to do something drastic to bolster up the financial edifice which tottering to its foundations. And so it was to give to Germany in debt the huge sums in the Bank of France and an indemnity, quite as much as to satisfy the threats and swagger of the military party, the pan-Germanists and the dreamers of a greater Germany, "that William II. was driven to declare the present war."

different leaders have conducted the devotional services and there has failed to appear the unity and continuity which is essential to the largest interest and value. Marked gains will be effected in this respect this year, and no committee work or meeting of boards, whatever, will take place during the devotional periods.

All the work of the United Baptists of the Maritime Provinces will be considered during the convention, including home and foreign missions, social and moral reform, Grand Ligne mission, Acadia University, ministers' annuity, ministerial aid and relief, Sunday schools, ministers' salaries, Western missions and The Maritime Baptist.

The Baptist Historical Society will meet during the convention week. Among the speakers of note who will address meetings open to the public are Rev. G. B. Cutten, M.A., Ph.D., president of Acadia University; Rev. H. T. DeWolf, principal of Acadia Ladies' Seminary; Rev. W. L. Archibald, principal of Acadia Collegiate and Business Academy; Rev. James A. Francis, brilliant pastor of the late Dr. Gordon's church in Boston; Mr. J. S. Poitras and Rev. E. Bosworth, representing Grande Ligne Mission; Rev. J. G. Brown, D.D., the able secretary of the Canadian Foreign Missions, and others.

It is a matter of deep regret that the organ has not yet been moved to its new place in the Brunswick Street Baptist church, it being impossible to get this portion of the renovating plan executed before the opening of the convention. When this is accomplished the auditorium will present an unusual attraction. A great deal of work has been done on the auditorium and the convention will be welcomed to a much better place of meeting than would have been the case before the work had been spent upon the church, both inside and out.

During the months of July and August and Brunswick Street Baptist churches worshipped with the George Street church. In September the vestry of the church was used, although it only accommodated about half the usual congregation. The church is now nearing the condition of occupancy and the congregation is anticipating the use of this inviting place of worship.

ENLISTED AS SINGLE MAN

An unusual case has been brought to the notice of the local military authorities during the past few days. A local young man who is now at Halifax with the special company from the 71st Regiment enlisted as a single man and his wife and small child, who resides at Bakers' Point, have been unable to secure the Dominion government's allowance of \$20 per month. It is understood that the local officers will forward the couple's marriage certificate to Halifax and have arrangements made so that the wife can receive the money.

CASE BEING CONTINUED.

The non-jury case of McLellan vs Nason is being continued today in the Court of King's Bench before Chief Justice Landry. The case for the plaintiff has been concluded and the evidence for the defendant is being taken this afternoon. The trial will likely occupy the first part of tomorrow.

LOCAL NEWS

NASHWAAKSIS COUPLE WED.

A pretty wedding took place last evening at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon McFarlane, Nashwaaksis, when their daughter, Miss Grace Margaret Catherine Smith, was united in marriage to Mr. Harold Staples also of that place. Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith, pastor of St. Paul's Presbyterian church in this city, performed the ceremony in the presence of a large number of friends and relatives. Mr. and Mrs. Staples will reside at Nashwaaksis.

THE PATRIOTIC FUND.

A meeting of the committee which is looking after the patriotic fund was held in the Board of Trade rooms last evening. Those present included Col. Loggie, J. J. McCaffery, W. G. Clark, A. R. Slipp, Judge Wilson, and Dr. T. C. Allen. Col. Loggie reported that the balance in the bank belonging to the Soldiers' Wives League, amounting to \$40, had been loaned to the patriotic fund. It was decided to leave subscription lists open at the city hall and Crown Land Office. Judge Wilson and Mr. Slipp were appointed a committee to confer with the York County Council in regard to cases for relief arising in the county. They will also communicate with the Sunbury County Authorities.

THE REPORT IS READY.

The report of the Royal Commission on the Dugal charges is now in the hands of the lieutenant governor and will likely be laid before the government at the regular meeting next week. In the meantime so it is said, a gentle hint from a high source will be thrown out to Premier Flemming to resign and if he fails to govern himself accordingly he will be kicked out. As the retirement of the premier dissolves the government, Acting Premier Clarke will be called upon to form a new administration.

WANTED A HOLIDAY.

Upon the occasion of the mayor's patriotic holiday the students of the High School, with natural military buoyancy, petitioned for an opportunity to accede to the request of the chief magistrate, but was informed, through the secretary, that the trustees could not legally close the school for that purpose.

The young ladies of the High School sent a request to the trustees for provision of some place where they can practise basket ball. As there is no gymnasium in connection with any of the city schools they suggest that the trustees could provide for them in the Y.M.C.A. Hall. While the trustees seemed to have sympathy with their request they did not feel able to go farther. Mr. Hebert, science instructor in the High School, wrote to the board lamenting the inferior accommodation for his classes. The apartment is in the basement, is dark, damp, poorly heated, ventilated and too small. The trustees hope to provide a better class room for this important work later.

Miss Bessie B. McElveny, at present teaching in St. John, applies for a position in her home town, and her name was recorded in the applicants' book. Mr. J. A. Edmonds, at present in Westmorland county, asks for position of principal in the new building and submits testimonials. The name was placed in the book.

MANY APPLICATIONS.

Additional applications were received for position of janitor in Smythe Street school. Yesterday applications were read from John Valentine, Austin B. Scott, Thomas Powers, Smith Mesereau, John Doherty and C. Malcolm Beatty. These will be considered later.

Mr. Sterling, from the committee made report respecting the disposal of some of the bonds of the Smythe Street school house. The war has affected very much the immediate sale of bonds but he was able to report satisfactory arrangements with the banks in the meantime.

NEW SCHOOL BUILDING.

Contractor Corbett has made satisfactory progress with the new school building and will doubtless be able to hand it over in accordance with the time limit of his contract. Everybody speaks approvingly of its appearance and it is certainly a credit to Fredericton. Mr. Sterling and Mr. Spurden were appointed to arrange for a line fence at the building.

The session of the board yesterday was a long one and several matters of a routine character were dealt with, and these included requests for increase of salary and other favors. The pay sheet submitted by the secretary contained the first payment of the general increase of salary to the teachers.

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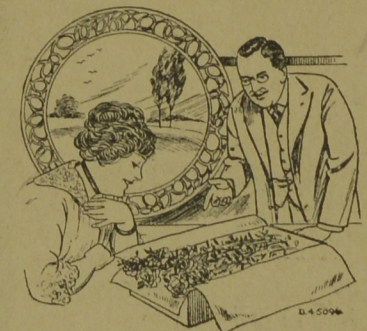
