## PRESQUE ISLE DOCTOR TURNED OVER TO MAINE AUTHORITIES

Boston, Sept. 30.—Dr. Linell E. Dudley, Miss Etta Pelletier, Miss Alice Pelletier and Miss Kate Michaud, all of Presque Isle and Houlton, Me., who were arrested by Boston police with the assistance of Deputy Sheriff Lawlis and County Solicitor Archibald of Aroostook county, that state, were yesterday discharged from the custody of the local courts and turned over to the Maine authorities on charges of being implicated in an illegal operation upon and the subsequent disappearance of Miss Mildred Sullivan, seventeen years old, of Houlton, Me.

They probably will be taken back to Maine this forenoon by Deputy Sheriff Lawlis and County Solicitor Archibald.

No trace has been found of the missing girl. The Maine officers do not hesitate to express their belief in the theory that the "prettiest girl in Aroostook county" met with foul play, and while they have prosecuted a diligent search in Boston and vicinity for persons implicated in the girl's case, officers in Maine have been equally as industrious in running to earth any and all clues that might lead to the discovery of Miss Sullivan or the finding of her body.

Dr. Dudley and the Pelletier women were again arraigned before Judge Duff in the Municipal Court yesterday on charges alleging statutory offenses, but after a conference between Attorney Harrington, for the defendants, Detective Sergt. Irwin, Judge Duff and Deputy Sheriff Lawlis, acting for the State of Maine, the local charges were placed on file and the prisoners turned over to the Maine officials. Miss Michaud, who was arrested at Acton Center Monday night, was then given a hearing, on the charge of being implicated in the crime alleged to have been committed in connection with the disappearance of Miss Sullivan. Her case, too, was placed on file in the local court. IDENTIFICATION NOT POSITIVE. Miss Michaud, after having spent

the night in the Tombs, arrived at the Court House shortly after nine o'clock yesterday morning and was immediately placed in the women's cage of the second session.

Sergt. Irwin called shortly afterwards, in company with a newspaper photographer of this city, who came up on the Bar Harbor boat, which plies between that point and Rockland, where it makes connection with the steamer bound for Boston. According to the man's statement it was last Tuesday night when he made the trip and his attention was attracted to two young women, one of whom was lying on a couch in the women's cabin and evidently quite ill. Sergt. Irwin had the man in court yesterday morning to see if he could identify Miss Michaud as being the young woman who was attending a sick travelling companion.

The photographer looked her over carefully for half a minute and looking at Sergt. Irwin said:

"She has the build of the woman I saw on the boat attending the sick girl, but I am not fully convinced my identification is complete. On the boat I only saw her profile and noted that she had rather pointed features, and the general appearance of both are almost identical, but I will not state for a positive fact that she is the girl."

It is alleged by the police that she admitted having assisted Miss Sullivan to board a train for Boston, but she balked at that point. She declared without the slightest reservation that she had known Dr. Dudley and this flatly contradicts the statement made by Dudley that he did not know her and had never to his knowledge seen her.

Many conflicting stories have come from the quartet of prisoners now held and to be removed to Maine today. The investigators believe that this will result in a clear breast of the whole business from one of the prisoners.

## THE GERMAN WINGS ARE FOLDING

captured the German positions near Augustowo and Koptzyewo (government of Suwalki).

"The German siege artillery continues bombarding Ossowetz (Russian Poland) without success.

### GALICIA NOW CLEAR

London, Sept. 30.—The Rome correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company says that it is officially announced, in advices from Petrograd, that the Austrian province of Galicia is now completely freed of Austrians, the last remnants of their troops having sought refuge in the Carpathians.

### 500 AUTOMOBILES TAKEN

London, Sept. 30.—In a despatch from Rome, the correspondent of the Central News says that the Russian ambassador announces that an Austrian army, fleeing before the Russians, has been surrounded near Douklo, and that its defeat is complete.

All the food, ammunition and war material which was being conveyed back to Austria has fallen into Russian hands. The capture includes five hundred military automobiles.

### FIGHTING IN SILESIA

London, Sept. 30.—An official statement issued in Berlin today and received here through the Marconi Wireless Company, follows:

"The Russians in trying to cross the Carpathians in small columns and break through into Hungary, have been repulsed everywhere.

"As these are operating a great distance from the main theatre of war, their movements are unimportant, but if the intention was to create a disquiet among the Hungarian population it has been entirely frustrated.

"As a result of new operations commenced by the United German Army to Hungarian forces, the enemy on both sides of Weichsel (in Silesia, on the Vistula) has retreated. Large masses of troops have been dispersed near Biecz (Galicia) while on the north of Weichsel several divisions of the enemy's cavalry have been driven in front of the German army."

### AUSTRIAN STORY

Vienna, via Amsterdam and London, Sept. 30.—Archduke Frederick of Austria, commander-in-chief of the Austrian army, today issued the following army order:

"The situation of the Germans and Austrians is favorable. The Russian offensive is beginning to break down. We, with the German troops, shall beat again the enemy already beaten

at Krasnik, Zamoso, (both towns of Russian Poland), Insterburg and Tanenbourg (the last two places named are in East Prussia).

"The German main army, without hindrance, has penetrated deep into France, where a new and great victory is imminent.

"In the Balkan theatre we are fighting in the enemy's territory. The Serbian resistance is beginning to weaken.

"Internal dissatisfaction, insurrections and lack of food threaten our enemy in the rear, while the dual monarchy and Germany are united, and have full confidence of fighting out to the end this war which was forced upon us.

"This is the truth about the situation. This proclamation must be made known to all officers and men in their respective mother tongues.

London, Sept. 30.—A Central News despatch from Antwerp says: "The Germans again bombarded Alost and set the town afire. Fierce fighting is raging at various points along the whole line."

### HOSPITAL SHELLED.

London, Sept. 30.—In a despatch from Antwerp the correspondent of the Reuter Telegram Company says that four wounded men and two women were killed by a shell which pierced the roof of a hospital at Lierre yesterday during the German bombardment.

The ward in which the wounded men lay was completely wrecked.

### IN HONORABLE CUSTODY

London, Sept. 30.—The following official despatch has been received by wireless from Berlin:

"The German Military Governor of Brussels has announced the arrest of Burgomaster Max by public poster as follows:

"I have found myself obliged to suspend Burgomaster Max from his office on account of his irreconcilable attitude. He is now in honorable custody in a fortress."

### GERMANS DESTROY TOWN.

London, Sept. 30.—The correspondent of the Reuter Telegram Company at Amsterdam, says that a despatch has been received there from Berlin stating the German General staff announces that the surgeon general of the army has sent the following telegram to Emperor William:

"An expedition sent out to Orchies, France on Sept. 24, composed of one battalion of the Landwehr, encountered superior hostile forces. The Germans were obliged to retreat losing twenty-eight dead and thirty-five wounded. The next day Bavarian troops were sent out but found no enemy at Orchies. The inhabitants had fled the town which has now been destroyed by the Germans."
