## MARITIME BAPTISTS TO MEET HERE OCTOBER 17

Large Number of Delegates are Expected---Interesting Program Will be Carried Out---Many Noted Speakers to Take Part

The annual Baptist convention of the Maritime Provinces will open in the Brunswick Street Baptist church on Saturday, Oct. 17th, and will continue until Wednesday, Oct. 21st. The program of the United Baptist Institute which convenes on Friday, Oct. 16th, in the vestry of the Brunswick Street Baptist church, is a very interesting one and includes papers by Rev. H. T. DeWolf, B.A., D.D., principal of Acadia Seminary, Wolfville, on "The Minister as Interpreter"; Rev. C. P. Wilson, B.A., B.D., on "The Efficient Mid-week Meeting"; Rev. W. D. Wilson, field secretary of the Prince Edward Island Temperance Alliance on "The Church and the Temperance Issue"; Rev. I. S. Nowlan, B.A., B.Th., on "The Place of the Minister in the Sunday School World." An open parliament will be conducted by Rev. J. A. Francis, D.D., of Boston, and at the evening session in the auditorium of the church, Rev. W. N. Hutchins, M.A., Ph.D., and Dr. Francis will be the speakers. The convention proper will open at ten o'clock on Saturday. One of the outstanding features of the gathering will be the devotional half hour at the opening of each session, which will be conducted throughout by Rev. Dr. Francis, pastor of the Clarendon Street Baptist church of Boston, Mass., and one of the most inspiring devotional speakers of the present day. ## THE CITY SCHOOL BOARD IN REGULAR MONTHLY SESSION

Smythe Street School Building Will be Ready in December---Miss Sherman Resigns---Many Applicants For Janitorship

The regular monthly meeting of the school board was held yesterday afternoon with the chairman, Dr. Vanwart, presiding. The other members in attendance included Mr. Sterling, Mr. Spurden, Mrs. Clark, Mrs. Cox, Dr. Crockett, Mr. Lemont and Sec'y Sampson. The absent members were Mr. Weddall, who is in Ottawa, and Mr. Hughes, engaged in court. From the report of the secretary it was shown that some of the teachers have entirely too many pupils to expect satisfactory results. With the large number in attendance and limited accommodations the trustees have found it necessary to remove many children from their district to one more remote in order to keep the classes in reasonably working size. It is hopeful however, to have the new building ready for occupancy after Christmas, when this difficulty will be overcome. The number of permits issued to new pupils this year is approximately the same as last year. The teachers who were across the seas have returned home and the working is proceeding along normal lines. A letter was read from Miss Sherman of the Morrison Mill School, who is at present absent on two months leave of absence, tendering her resignation at the completion of her leave of absence. This young lady has been a highly satisfactory member of the city staff end the

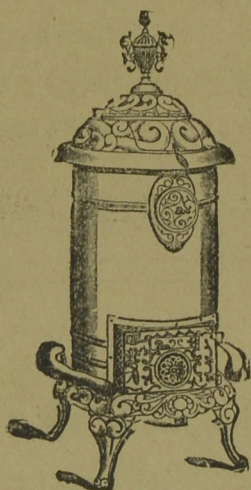

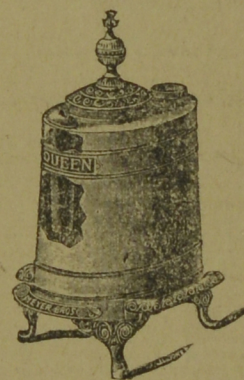
