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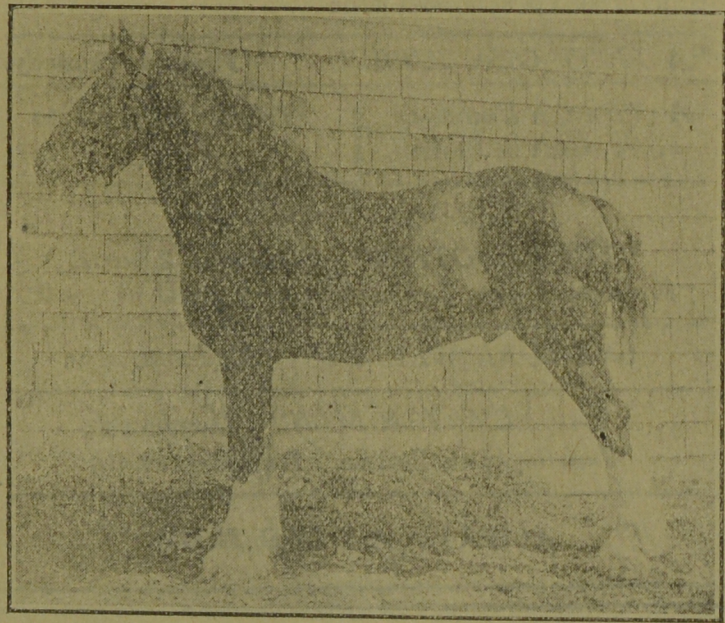

Fabre of Montreal was Second--Canadian Runners
Made Great Showing in American Long Distance
Classic--Time was Four Minutes Behind the
Record

Boston, April 20—The Marathon race—twenty nine miles—was started soon after noon in the presence of a quarter of a million people.

Five miles from the start Lorden, of Cambridge, and Kyrone, of Brooklyn, were abreast, followed by Antonizo, of East Boston; Robinson, of Dorchester; Hanigan, of Malden; Madden and Roth, of Roxbury; McInerney, of Philadelphia; Mayer of Mount Vernon, N.Y.; Duffy of Hamilton, Ont., and Fabre, of Montreal.

At the turn into the boulevard, sixteen miles from the start, Kyrone was in the lead, but the time, one hour, thirty five minutes, was twelve minutes below the record. Duffy and Fabre were running side by side in second place, one minute behind. Then came Hollowell, of New York; Lorden, Lilley of Dorchester; Madden and Bell of Montreal.

At Lake street, five miles from the finish, Fabre and Duffy had passed Kyrone, who trailed them by twenty seconds. Lorden was fourth, Roth fifth and then came Bell and Allan. The time was one hour and fifty four minutes, twelve seconds, nearly ten minutes behind the record.

Duffy won; time, two hours, twenty five minutes, one second; Fabre second, time, two hours, twenty five minutes, sixteen seconds; Carlson third, and was disqualified. The time was almost four minutes behind the record for the course which is 22.18 1-5.

Lorden was given third place on account of Carlson being disqualified; Bell was fourth.
