I. C. R. TRAIN AGENTS AND METHODS OF APPOINTMENTS

The Moncton Transcript has an article on the appointment of train agents on the I.R.C., which has considerable local interest. Extracts from it are as follows:

"The question of placing train agents on the Intercolonial Railway in 1912 was a very interesting subject of conversation and on the 29th of January, 1913, the Hon. Mr. Emmerson moved for copies of all the papers and documents pertaining to the subject. This return has only just been brought down, a year after it was ordered.

"IRREGULARITIES."

"The first document is a memorandum dated February 24, 1912, in which the alleged 'question of irregularities of our conductors' is discussed, and Chairman Campbell stated that Mr. Bell had reported that the worst section of the line, from the reports of the special agents is that between St. Flavie and Levis.

"He suggested that nine men be put on that section of the road. Subsequently, Mr. Bell suggested that a secret service man might be put on each train for the first week and the traffic auditors all on the one section of the line and claimed that one of the results would be a reduction in the amount of ticket refunds.

directed that the train agents be—"On April 20, 1912, the minister between Levis and St. Flavie were to be taken off and placed on the district between Halifax and St. John.

DR. LANDRY'S BROTHER.

"Hon. Dr. D. V. On August 23, Mr. O. Crockett, brother of O. S. Crockett, then M.P. for York, was recommended for train agent.

F. T. YEOMANS.

"The case of Frederick T. Yeomans recommended from Fredericton, as train agent, was objected to by the provident board officials because he was over thirty-five years of age. He had previously been placed on the list by having been recommended according to the prevailing form. On

October 15 the Department at Ottawa directed that Mr. Yeomans be taken on and given a fair trial. On November 8 it was decided that he, (Mr. Yeomans) could not do the work and his services were to be dispensed with in that capacity. Then again on November 28 Mr. Yeomans was given a further three months' trial, it being very desirable that the Fredericton Tories should be pleased.

AMAZING APPETITES

Some Remarkable Feats Performed by Hearty Eaters

A man living in Massachusetts, before entering on an egg-eating contest, was known as the champion fried egg-eater of the Berkshires. Austria Had First Postcard

The honor of having been the first country to use the postcard belongs to Austria, where it was introduced in 1869 as the result of the suggestions of Dr. Hermann. Its price was rather less than a cent, and at first its users were allowed to write only 20 words upon it. The card appeared in England exactly one year later to the very day. The first picture postcard was apparently one sent from the model of the Eddystone Lighthouse at the Royal Naval Exhibition in 1891.

SUPERLATIVES IN TREES

The largest orange tree in the south is a gigantic specimen which grows out of the rich soil in Terrebonne Parish, La. It is fifty feet high and fifteen feet in circumference at the base. Its yield has often been 10,000 oranges per season.

The largest oak tree left standing in England is "Cowthorpe's Oak," which is seventy-eight feet in circumference at the ground. The oldest tree in Britain is Parliamentary Oak, in Clipstone Park, London, which is known to be 1,530 years old.

The largest apple tree in New York State is said to be one standing near the town of Wilson. It was planted in the year 1815 and it is on record that it once yielded thirty-three full barrels of apples in a single season.

There are 413 species of trees found growing within the limits of the United States. The curiosity of the whole lot is the black ironwood, of Florida, which is thirty per cent heavier than water. Well dried black ironwood will sink in water almost as quickly as will a bar of lead.

The "life tree" of Jamaica is harder to kill than any other species of woody growth known to arboriculturists. It continues to grow and thrive for months after being uprooted and exposed to the sun.

FOOD AND EVOLUTION

A Professor Attributes Man's Development to Dietary Causes

Tracing the evolution of man from the anthropoids, Prof. Carveth Reed in a British Association paper, showed that the prominent differences all arose from a change of food. When some, or even one, of the fruit-eating apes of the forest acquired a taste for animal food sufficiently strong to lead to persistent seeking for it, then a new habit was formed, and it brought remarkable results.

The beast of prey would be able to live on the ground and to go beyond the forest. He would join other animals in hunting—especially in hunting big game—and from co-operation would arise communication leading to articulate speech. The food supply being more regular through the year, the seasonable marriage and birth time would cease.

The new life would require great increase in knowledge and intelligence, for a higher skill was required to catch a rabbit than to pluck a banana, and he would have to learn the different animals and how to track them. He would evolve the use of weapons and snares. The best hunter would follow his prey on the ground and on foot, and the erect gait would become normal, the legs becoming lengthened, the arms shortened, the feet specialized, and the hands developed.

The flesh diet would bring shortening of the alimentary canal, while great variability in stature, size of brain and shape of skull would result. Cannibalism may have been simply the inclusion of foes in the game eaten and is a mark of the experimental stage of human development instead of being a general practice of true carnivores.

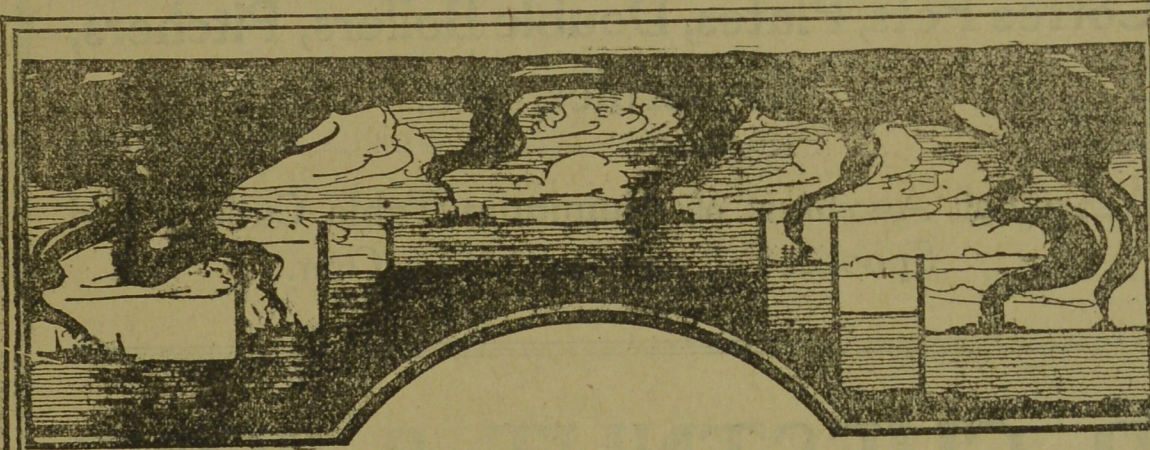
