## TIME-ALLOWANCE RULE SAID TO BE WORKING WELL

Producing Better Fields in Class  
Events—Laying up of Horses is  
Discouraged by the Rule

The question has been asked many times of late as to how the new-time allowance rules were working out. Perhaps no better answer can be given than the following editorial from the American Sportsman, a journal which when the rules were made could see only harm come from them.

Since the opening of the racing season in this section we have observed that this rule has had the effect of bettering the fields in the class events also, and we know of several races in which good fields started and furnished good contests that would have failed to fill but for the adoption of the winrace rule. Thus far we have had the pleasure of being present at four race meetings and have seen another effect of the rule that is worthy of comment.

Ever since we have followed the harness horse we have noted what a small number of drivers seem to desire to win at the early race meetings and have on many occasions at betless meetings, where no other money than the purse was in sight, been certain that the winner could have been defeated by several of the field that failed to show in front. There being no possible betting combination, such results looked very odd and naturally we have quietly investigated on some such occasions.

Almost invariably the trainer would state that he would have tried but was afraid that he would give his horse a record and then fail to win the necessary heats to get the big end of the purse, as he did not think him up to a race; that if he had been sure he could have won he would have driven for the record without any regard for the record he might take. Such an explanation ceases to be a valid one under the new winrace rule and thus one of the old and time-honored excuses goes to the discard.

Relieved of the fear of securing a record with no money in return, we have seen a number of drivers try for races this year who frankly told us that they did not believe they were ready, but, since under the new rule a losing heat would not be a bar, they were going to do their best. The result has been that events have been split-heat affairs in many cases and the public has been treated to interesting and thrilling contests, while in several instances drivers who thought their horses were not ready have been able to pull down first money.

With the honest drivers relieved of the fear of a record in the losing race and driving to win, and with judges enforcing the rules against those drivers who will still persist in driving the best horse in the rack we can see a much improved condition in harness racing.

## "GUNBOAT" SMITH IN GOOD SHAPE FOR FRIDAY'S BOUT

Carpentier and Smith to Meet—  
American Has Had Good Record  
And Frenchman Looks Good

London, July 13—Training at Harrow, Gunboat Smith has worked himself into excellent shape for his twenty-round bout with Georges Carpentier, the French heavyweight champion, on Friday. Smith has been hitting hard with both hands and hammering his training partners unmercifully.

Carpentier is taking extraordinary means to put himself in the best possible shape, according to advice here tonight from Manitot, France. The Frenchman's manager, Descamps has said he believed Georges would win by a knockout within six rounds.

The advance sale of seats reached thirty thousand dollars last night.

If Gunboat Smith fails, it will be high time for America to awake to a realization that pugilistically she is slipping.

If the Gunner does not stop Carpentier, says The Boston Post, and in quick order, then past performances in the roped square are valueless as a basis for estimating the respective abilities of boxers. Smith's work in the ring is so far above that of Carpentier in nearly all respects that the Frenchman does not appear to be in the same class with the Gunner. Smith has met and defeated a large majority of the best heavyweights of the present time, including the formidable Sam Langford.

The only heavyweight of prominence beaten by Carpentier, is Bombardier Wells, who was a plaything in the hands of Smith. Carpentier also was stopped by two American middleweights, Klaus and Papke, and was held to even terms by such middleweights as Harry and Willie Lewis Jeff Smith and Bayonne and others of that calibre.

BEATEN BY DIXIE KID.

Carpentier was beaten in five rounds by the Dixie Kid in 1911, and up to date the French idol cannot point to a clean-cut victory over any man of good class, either middleweight or heavyweight. The present voyage of the Frenchman is due entirely to his knockouts of the king of glass-jaw phenomena, Bombardier Wells.

There is not a shadow of doubt that Chip, Clabby, Gibbons or McGoorty could dispose of Carpentier, and it will be astonishing if the Frenchman lasts more than a dozen rounds with the Gunner. On the other hand, Gunboat Smith has a really brilliant record with men of class.

The Gunner won from Maran on points in twenty rounds, the same as Jack Johnson did, and he followed this up with a twenty-round decision over the gigantic Jess Willard, which is the only battle Willard ever lost on points.

Mainstep, 2.16 should be a mighty useful trotter when he rounds into condition.





The Boston Globe says:—Jack Leonard is to drive Clara Walker and the other Woody Hill Farm horses from now on. George Downer will continue to train them.


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
