## BRIDGE CREW AT OROMOCTO THIS WEEK

Ballasting Operations Well Advanced—New Pit at the Barony

The bridge-erecting crew of the Dominion Bridge Company is expected to begin work at Oromocto on the line of the St. John & Quebec Railway this week. The bridges west of Fredericton are now built. Ballasting has been done for fourteen miles west of Fredericton and has been completed from Woodstock to The Barony where a new ballast pit is to be opened this week. The ballasting will not be completed till autumn. At Hart's Lake a short distance above Gagetown two concrete piers have been damaged by sliding. At the railway office here it is said the damage is not serious and can be repaired easily. J. H. Corbett & Son Inc., have begun work on the St. John-Gagetown section from Gagetown to the King's County line.

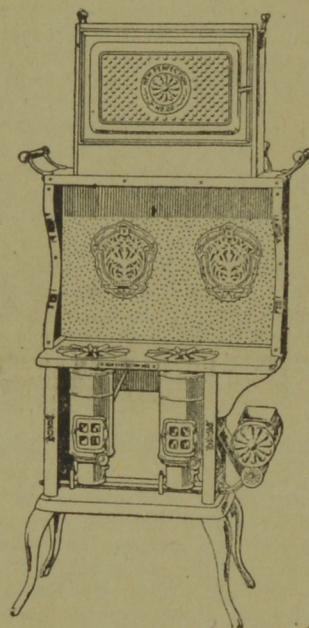

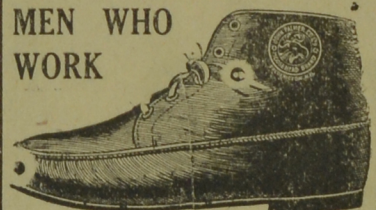
