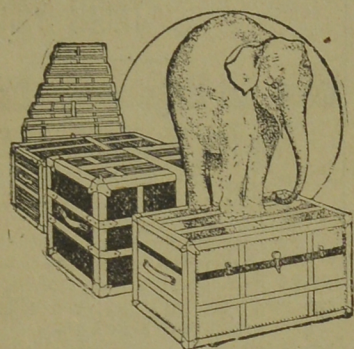

L. W. PALMER'S PAPERS WERE ALL SAVED

Moncton Transcript
Mr. C. W. Price, Chief Train Des-
patcher of the I. C. R. accompanied
by Mrs. Price returned to the city
yesterday from Quebec, whither they
had gone for the purpose of identifying
the bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard
Palmer, who were guests at
"The Grange," Mr. Price's suburban
residence for two months recently,
and who perished in the Empress of
Ireland disaster.

Interviewed by the Transcript, Mr.
Price told a brief but graphic story
of his search for the bodies and also
gave some new and interesting facts
in connection with the death of the
Palmers.

"We arrived in Quebec about noon
Friday," said Mr. Price, "but it was
three o'clock in the afternoon before
we got into the shed where the un-
claimed bodies were lying. At that
time not a great many of the corpses
had been positively identified. I went
alone and in company with C. P. R.
officers went over the long rows of
dead searching for the bodies of the
Palmers. It was some time before I
found them. Mr. Palmer himself look-
ed quite natural, in fact his face was
not in the least distorted. His face
looked natural, as I have seen men
who have been killed in railroad ac-
cidents. There were several small
bruises on his face, and I believe
that he was killed before his body
was carried off by the water. He had
apparently had time to put on his
trousers, but besides his pajamas,
which I had seen him wearing a hun-
dred times, during his stay at my
house, he was unclothed.

"Some other people had already
claimed him as a man named Ham-
ilton. The mistake arose because of
the fact that Mr. Palmer had in his
trousers pocket some keys believed
to have belonged to a firm to which
Hamilton was attached. It later
proved that Mr. Palmer was also con-
nected with the firm. The initials
'L. W. P.' on his pajamas effectually
disposed of the matter.

"The body of Mrs. Palmer was for
various reasons not easily identified.
Mrs. Price was at last able to iden-
tify it and her belief was confirmed
by the finding on the night robe of
her initials, which were marked on
every article of her wardrobe.

"We had the bodies embalmed and
shipped to England. I also insisted
that Mr. Leonard W. Palmer's private
papers, which had floated ashore
and been picked up practically in-
tact, should be returned with the
bodies to his home in England. In
addition to his will and private pa-
pers, there were a number in connec-
tion with his work for the Financial
News and that journal is sending a
man to Quebec to recover the docu-
ments, some of which however, were
so spoiled by the sea water as to be
almost illegible.

"From what I could see, I believe
Mr. Palmer escaped from his cabin
to the deck but was killed before
taking to the water. Otherwise his
body would have been as unrecognizable
as some of the other bodies. His
hands were tightly clenched upon his
breast. Mrs. Palmer had apparently
been drowned."

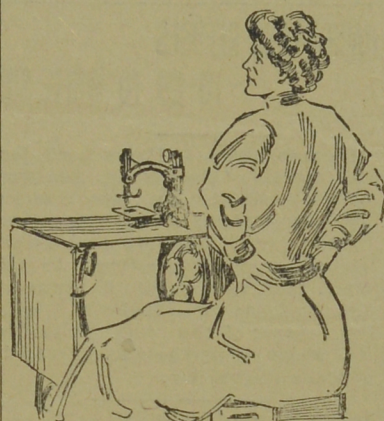

THE I. C. R. AND THE TRAVELLING PUBLIC

To the Editor of the Telegraph:

Sir,—We notice in one of the Freder-
icton papers a protest from W. S.
Tompkins, one of the Massey-Harris
travelers, against the
quality of the service given the trav-
elling public by the I.C.R. accom-
modation train leaving Fredericton
at 5 o'clock in the morning. Mr. Tomp-
kins claims the service is a dis-
grace to the people's road. We want to en-
dorse this protest as it is in the public
interest that the management of the
people's road should get on
their job. The travelers representing
the different companies of the mari-
time provinces have to travel by this
and by this morning train from
Fredericton, and we pay as much for
the service as though the service was
first class. We are not kickers when
treated half right, and we bring the
attention of the management of this
line to the condition of the service
such as was offered to the public on
the morning of June 3rd an old
car that should have been relegated
to the junk heap years ago. In fact
the first class cars on this road are
not nearly as comfortable as the sec-
ond class smokers of the C. P. R.
on any of their branch lines. The 1,
200 commercial travellers of the mari-
time provinces who have to patron-
ize this road are a unit in demanding
a service more in keeping with the
people's railway, and we endorse the
protest made by Mr. Tompkins
and commend his effort in refusing
to accept any longer the service given
to the public on this line, which
is far below the requirements of a
public road.

We have no fault to find with the
trainmen, who are both courteous
and untiring in their effort to care
for the patrons of the road with facili-
ties at their command. Since this
matter has been brought to the at-
tention of the management, unless a
better car service is given an official
protest will be made to the Rail-
way Commissioner. The people are
paying, Mr. Editor, that the man-
agement of the I.C.R. have got to
put a more up-to-date car on the ac-
commodation trains between Freder-
icton and Chatham and they will see
that it is done.

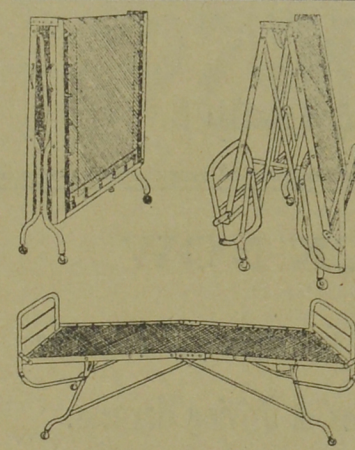
