TWO PORTRAITS
TO BE PRESENTED TO
SUPREME COURT

Charles G. Carter to Present Portrait of His Grandfather Sir James Carter--One of Sir Frederic Barker Also Presented

The June sittings of the Court of Appeals will open in this city tomorrow morning. Unusual features of the sittings will be the unveiling of two portraits recently presented to the Barristers' Society of New Brunswick to be placed in the Supreme Court chamber.

One portrait is that of the late Sir James Carter, former chief justice of New Brunswick, which has been presented by Mr. Charles G. Carter, who at present is living on Woodstock Road. Mr. Carter is a grandson of the late chief justice. The other portrait is that of Sir Frederic Barker, ex-chief justice of the province, which was purchased by subscription by the members of the Barristers' Society. Sir Frederic recently sat for the portrait in Montreal.

WAS MURDERED
AT ATHENS, GA.

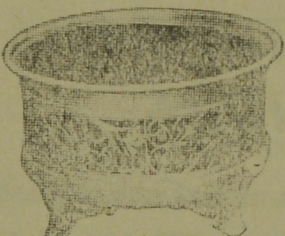
Further Particulars of His Death Received by His Mother-in-law, Mrs. W. G. Dykeman--Was Shot and Killed by a Poacher

Mrs. W. G. Dykeman has received word from Athens, Ga., to the effect that her son-in-law, Prof. J. W. Hartt, whose sudden death was reported in these columns last week, was shot and killed by a poacher. Prof. Hartt, it seems, was employed by a syndicate of wealthy men to look after a large game preserve. He was making his rounds through the woods when he came upon a stranger, who was evidently bent on poaching. Prof. Hartt ordered him from the premises but the man, instead of complying, whipped out a revolver and fired three shots at the professor all taking effect. He only lived a short time. The murderer was captured and is now being held in custody.

The late Prof. Hartt, who was an agricultural expert, was at one time in charge of a creamery at Kingsclaire. Later on he was located in Kingston, Ont., and afterwards in Brazil and Argentina. He is survived by a widow and five children.

LATE MRS. FRED CARVELL

The funeral of the late Mrs. Fred Carvell took place this morning from the C.P.R. Station on the arrival of the Boston train. Rev. Neil McLaughlin conducted the service and interment was made at the Rural Cemetery. Mr. Carvell, husband of the deceased accompanied the remains and will return to Boston tonight.
