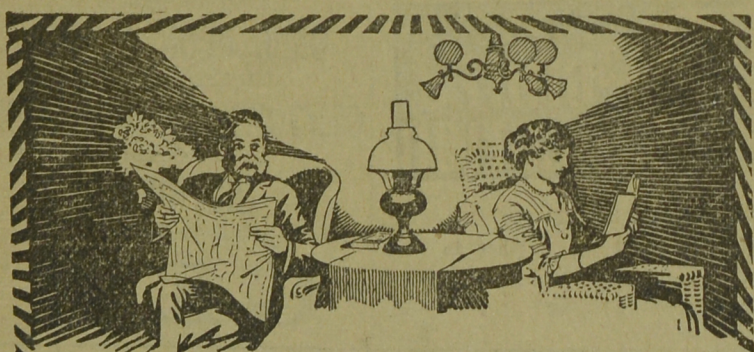

Federals Have Brought Back Many Who Have Spent Seasons With the Minors—Major Leagues Also Have a Few—Some of Them Who Again Will Have a Chance

New York, Feb. 7.—A big bunch of players are to return to the big league clubs this spring after sojourning for a time in the minor organizations. One of the most notable "come backs" this year is Pitcher Harry Covaleskie. When he played with the Philadelphia Nationals a few years ago Covaleskie was a terror to the batsmen, especially the heavy artillery of the New York Giants. At that time the Giants were able to make about all of the National pitchers back up, with the exception of the Pole in the Philadelphia uniform. Covaleskie beat the McGraw clan so easily and so often that he was dubbed the "Giant killer." Last season he starred with the Chattanooga team of the Southern League, and now he is to return to the big show as a member of the Detroit Tigers.

OTHER PITCHERS.

A number of other pitchers are scheduled to re-enter the big arena this spring. While these slasters lack the reputation of a Covaleskie to back them up, they all look good enough for one or more feeds at a big league hotel. Dode Cross, who joined the St. Louis Browns as a pitcher several years ago and later developed into the best pinch-hitter in the American League, returns to the major league as a member of the Yankees. Elmer Koestner, who was tried out several years ago by the Cleveland Naps, will essay to put over the proper shoots and benders for the Chicago Cubs. Another Cleveland cast-off pitcher, Bill James, who did some remarkable twirling for the Portland Pacific Coast League team last season, will be taken south by the St. Louis Browns.

Pitcher "Toots" Schulz, formerly of the Philadelphia Nationals, will be given a trial by Manager Jennings of Detroit. "Casey" Hagerman, who led the Western League pitchers last season, is another finger who will try to stick with the big circuit on his second trial. As a member of the Boston Red Sox a year or so ago "Casey" couldn't pitch and "Casey" couldn't bat. But he caught on with the Denver club, made his mark as a slaster and now he has been signed by the St. Louis Cardinals.

IN THE FEDERAL.

U. N. B. HOCKEY TEAM WORKING HARD FOR ACADIA GAME

"Mike" Murphy had his squad of U.N.B. players out yesterday afternoon. The practice, according to the players, was the best held this season. "Mike" spent most of the hour in combination play. The coach stated that with such a fast lot of skaters and stick-handlers on the forward line he thought he would be able to get good results from the different plays he was undertaking to teach them. Yesterday he instructed them in the rear pass and one of his own he calls the "Ish ca Hibble," or "I should worry." "Pete" Mooney was playing left wing yesterday and showed up well. It will be pretty hard to pick the other wing, with Oldham, Edington and Mooney all trying. Hipwell still plays at centre-ice, there being no opposition to him yesterday afternoon. McLean and Pugh are the fastest skaters of the team and work together well. Their speed was shown up to good advantage yesterday when they had to slow down to complete some of the combination plays, the others being too far behind. With just five days to get in line for the game here with Acadia, they will have to hustle as the Blue and Red will be sure to have a team which can go the hour. Mannheim is still in goal and is expected to give VanWart a hard chase for the position.

Snowey Baker, the Australian fight promoter, is on his way to America. Baker is making a tour of the world and incidentally signing up attractions for his fight club.

The new Federal League also will try out a number of former big league pitchers, among them "King" Cole, once the leading mound artist of the Chicago Cubs and last season with Columbus in the American Association; George Mullin, for years the old stand-by in the box for the Detroit Tigers, and last year in the International League; "Lefty" Leifield, formerly with Pittsburgh and Chicago and last season with the Pacific Coast League, and William Fismo, former White Sox hurler and last season with the Minneapolis club.

Infield and outfield artists as well as pitchers are numbered among the players who will try to show they are now able to hold up their end in the speedy set. "Lena" Blackburne, who is said to have cost the White Sox something like fifteen thousand dollars in real money a few seasons back, is to get another trial with the Sox. Blackburne first gained prominence in Providence, where he was hailed as the leading shortstop of the International League.

WITH THE MAJORS.

Another former big league infielder Third Baseman Billy Purtell, has affixed his signature to a Detroit American League contract. Purtell once was with the Chicago White Sox and later with the Boston Red Sox. Last year he did brilliant work for Montreal, finishing the season with a batting average of .316 for 152 games.

Jimmy Johnston, former Cleveland Nap and last season a star in the Pacific Coast League, has been signed with the Chicago Cubs. Johnston holds the P.C.L. base-stealing record with 123 pilfered sacks to his credit in 1913.

Outfielder Lester Channell is to don a New York American League uniform for the second time. He was purchased from Indianapolis by the Yankees three years ago but broke his leg early in the season and was out of the game for a year.

Catcher "Hickory" Johnson, formerly of the St. Louis Cardinals, is slated for an opportunity to show his wares to Manager McGraw of the Giants. "Hickory" was strong with the bat in the Western League last season, being the leading long-distance walloper of the league.

BOWLING LEAGUE IN PROCESS OF FORMATION

Manager Bert Smith of the Arctic Bowling Alleys, is trying to form a league in which each team will be represented by three men. The plan seems to be looked upon with favor by the bowlers. It is thought that a six-team league would be the most interesting. The likely teams to be represented are Bankers, Grocers, Algonquin Club, Arctic, Druggists and Hardware Men.

Eddie Roddy, manager of Mike Gibbons, is authority for the statement that the Packey McFarland-Mike Gibbons match is clinched and will be pulled off in New York in the near future.
