Guest of Honor

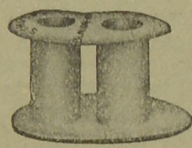

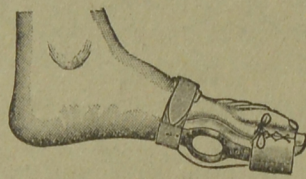

PERSIAN LAMB
RANCH COMPANY TO
BE INCORPORATED

Stock Imported From Texas for Ranch
at Lower Millstream Arrived
This Week---Agricultural Depart-
ment Interested in Venture

The Provincial Department of Agriculture has been notified of the importation of stock for the Persian Lamb ranch which is to be established at Lower Millstream, King's county. The stock, which was bought in Texas, is valued at \$2500 and consists of a pure-bred Karakul ram and twenty cross-bred Karakul ewes. The ram cost \$1500. The importation was made this week.

The sheep are natives of Persia but were imported into Texas some years ago. A very large flat tail is a remarkable feature of the sheep. The animals can go without food or water for several days, living upon the nourishment stored in their tails.

The Lower Millstream ranch is the second of its kind to be established in Canada, the other being upon Prince Edward Island. The company which is backing the venture, will apply for incorporation at an early date. Mr. John McAuley of Lower Millstream, is one of those interested in the ranch.

The new ranch is being regarded with keen interest by the Department of Agriculture as it is thought to be the beginning of an industry which will prove of importance to the province. The industry follows lines similar to fox-ranching. The lambs

DUMFRIES MAN
PLEADED GUILTY
TO ROBBERY

Charles Wiken Remanded Until Mon-
day---Another Man Thought to
Be Concerned in
Break

Detective James Roberts of this city who had been employed to secure evidence against the parties connected with the robbery at the Hibbard Company's blacksmith shop at the Barony which was entered on Monday evening last rounded up his man in short time. Detective Roberts went to Dumfries Thursday and returned to this city yesterday afternoon after getting a clue to the guilty man. He drove to Dumfries last night where he arrested Charles Wiken, when he was in bed at home.

Wiken appeared before Police Magistrate Marsh this morning and pleaded guilty of breaking and entering, and of stealing from the blacksmith shop. He was remanded till Monday.

The Hibbard Company's people seem to think there is another man equally as guilty, and are doing every thing in their power to have him punished. The goods stolen from the blacksmith shop consisted of drills, blacksmith's tools and other articles used in railroad construction.

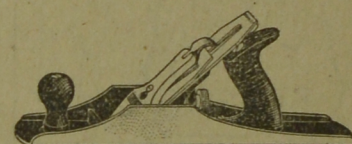
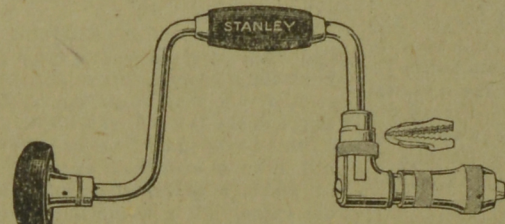
