RESTIGOUCHE IN LINE

The Liberals of the County of Restigouche at a large and representative convention which met in Campbellton on Monday, unanimously nominated Hon. C. H. LaBilloy and Mr. A. E. G. McKenzie as their standard bearers for the ensuing local election. In Restigouche a Liberal nomination is equivalent to a victory at the polls. Liberal sentiment is very strong in the county and so far as the opposition nominees are concerned, it will only be a question as to the size of their majority.

Hon. Mr. LaBilloy has represented Restigouche for thirty years without a break and his popularity with the people of the county is unimpaired. He was for eighteen years a member of the provincial government, filling successively the portfolios of agriculture and public works. During his long public service he has ever been faithful to the County of Restigouche and its best interests, and no man in public life is more universally esteemed. In Hon. Mr. LaBilloy the Acadians of the province have a representative of whom they have every reason to be proud.

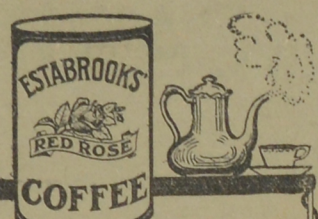
Mr. A. E. G. McKenzie, who has been nominated as the colleague of the ex-chief commissioner, is one of the most energetic and talented young men in New Brunswick today and he is destined to make his mark in public life. He completed a successful course in the Normal School some years ago and for a time followed the teaching profession. In 1890 he entered the U.N.B. as a senior matriculant and graduated in 1902 with the degree of B.A., taking his M.A. degree two years later. He studied law in St. John and was admitted to the bar six years ago and, ignoring the allurements of the west, he opened an office at Campbellton, where he has practised his profession with great success. Mr. McKenzie is well versed in political affairs and as a platform speaker has few if any superiors in the province. He will prove a valuable acquisition to the legislature of New Brunswick.

The Liberals of Restigouche are to be heartily congratulated on their splendid choice of candidates.

Toronto Globe.—The Tory Press used to speak of the Intercolonial Railway as a "sink hole" for the money of the people of Canada. Now that the Conservatives are in office the tune is changed. We are told by The Mail and Empire that "the State owned Intercolonial Railway has finished the fiscal year with a handsome surplus. Sufficient is known to indicate a surplus of upwards of \$600,000. Both the passenger and freight business have increased, but of gross earnings of ten and a half millions about one-quarter has been from the passenger service. In ten years the earnings of the road have practically doubled." Figures like these should end all talk of handing over the people's railway to Mackenzie & Mann to be incorporated in the Canadian Northern what the people have they will hold.

A political wind storm, embellished with braggadocio, gasconade, bluster, inflatedness, pomposity and exaggeration, swept over the village of Hillsboro on Monday. The muddy waters of the Petitcodiac were lashed into a fury, and it is reported that the famous tidal bore was put out of business for the time being. It all happened during the progress of a Tory pow-wow at which Hon. Harry McLeod and Walter B. Dickson, M. P., were the principal speakers.

Richeson, the Boston murderer who has been very much in the limelight for the past seven months, has expiated his atrocious crime in the electric chair. It is greatly to the credit of those responsible for the administration of criminal justice in Massachusetts that all efforts to work the insanity dodge in behalf of this wolf in sheep's clothing proved ineffective. The Tories of Albert in convention Monday re-nominated Messrs. Walter Burnham Dickson and George Don Pedro Prescott to uphold the standard of purity at the coming local election. Hon. H. F. McLeod was present and gave them a certificate of character.

An unrestricted market for potatoes meant \$14,000,000 for the farmers of Agostook County for the crop of 1911. When the New Brunswick farmers ask for free access to a market that will absorb their surplus crop it is treason.

The Flemming government which went into power pledged to economy has added one million dollars to the public debt and increased the annual expenditure by over four hundred thousand dollars.

THE STOCK MARKET IS SHOWING SOME WEAKNESS

New York, N.Y., May 22.—The market opening was active and generally lower but with evidence of good buying was on the decline. Scattered selling resulted from Roosevelt's victory in Ohio but apparently large interests were willing to take stocks despite that not unexpected development. United States Steel, Reading and Union Pacific opened at declines of 3, but the last named soon recovered its loss.

A lively spurt of bullish activity occurred shortly after the opening, but the stocks were supplied on the advance. In conservative quarters it was expected that the market would continue for some time, except possibly for bull movements in specialties.

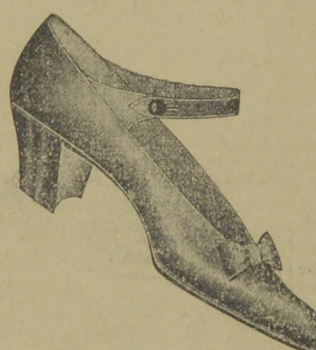
