IN MARITIME PROVINCES

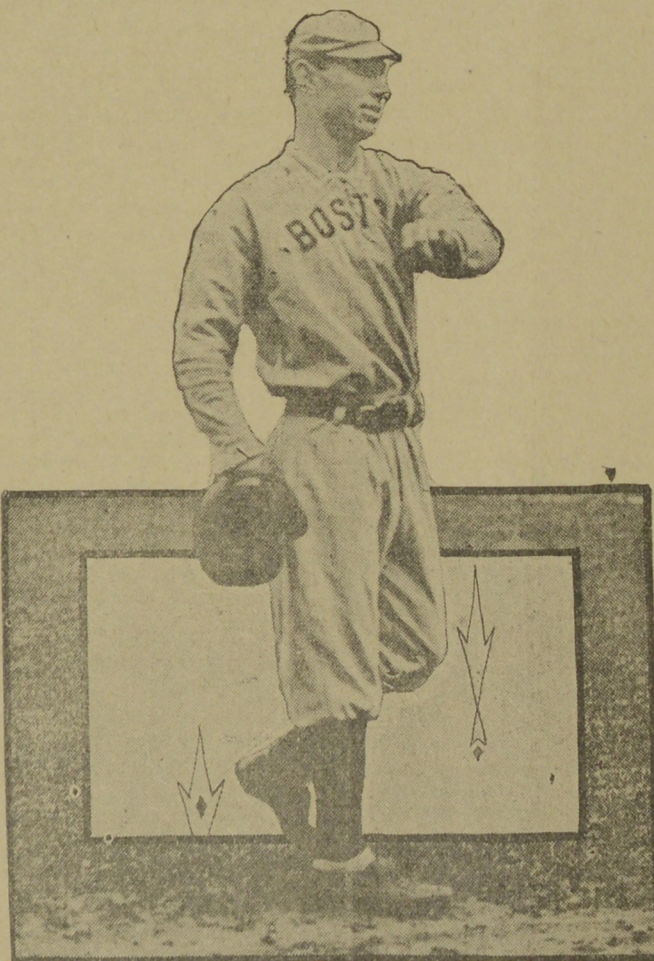
The statement going the rounds
