MATERIAL WITNESSES
WERE NOT AVAILABLE

Mr. Carvell Tells of Some of the Difficulties Encountered by Counsel for the Prosecution Before the Royal Commission--Mr. Corbett Had Contract Under the Federal Government and Remained Away.

Mr. F. B. Carvell, M.P., in his speech at the banquet here last week, related some of the difficulties which he as counsel for the prosecution, experienced in his work before the Royal Commission and told how material witnesses were spirited away. He said:

"Mr. J. H. Corbett is a gentleman for whom I have the very highest regard possible, a gentleman whom I have known for the last eight or ten years, a gentleman who built a large section of the Transcontinental Railway, a gentleman who has done a large business in the Province of New Brunswick, and who paid his debts. Mr. James H. Corbett is also a contractor on the Welland Canal, which is entirely under control of the federal government, and had this gentleman come to New Brunswick and told the truth about that \$10,000, he would have had to look out for himself. Mr. Corbett therefore, went to Pennsylvania and remained there during the proceedings. HAD MR. CORBETT BEEN IN NEW BRUNSWICK HE WOULD HAVE TOLD YOU THAT SOME DAY IN MAY, 1912, IN THE BRUNSWICK HOTEL IN MONCTON, HE PAID TO MR. FLEMING THE SUM OF \$10,000 IN CASH IN ROOM 36. We know the whole thing, we know the story, we know the gentleman who went there with him, we know the gentleman who helped him get the money out of the bank, we know that while this gentleman did not see the money paid he knows it was paid. We had this man in court, he sat there and listened to Mr. Flemming swear he did not receive the \$10,000 from Mr. J. H. Corbett, either directly or indirectly.

THE COMPANY'S BOOKS.

"Then we tried to get Mr. Lisman here, but he had business in Europe; we then tried to get the treasurer of the company, he was away on a vacation and could not be found, and for days and weeks and months we demanded in every mood and tense and did everything in our power that the books of the railway company be brought from New York and be laid before the court. Fifty-one per cent. of the stock of this company was vested in the government and the government had a right to appoint directors. Today the government is the St. John and Quebec Railway Company. The government had the power to go to New York and get the books. What do you suppose the answer was that we got from Mr. Clarke, the acting premier? Up to that time I thought Mr. Clarke was a little better than his associates, but when Mr. Clarke came out in the newspapers and made the statement over his

signature that the government did not own the stock and did not have anything to do with it. I concluded that it was a question of Birds of a feather flock together.

"The commission told them, time and time again, it was the duty of the government to bring those books; it was the duty of everybody concerned to bring those books, but the books stayed in New York and, as far as I know, they are there today. IF THOSE BOOKS COULD HAVE BEEN PRODUCED THEY WOULD HAVE SHOWN, NOT ONLY THE \$10,000 PAID TO MR. FLEMING BUT LARGE AMOUNTS PAID TO PROMINENT TORY MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE. They were not brought here and I do not think I will have to ask you to draw on your imagination to believe that they did not bring the books because they knew they would condemn them forever. HAD WE GOT BERRY HERE AND HAD WE GOT MR. CORBETT HERE AND HAD WE GOT THESE BOOKS HERE, WE WOULD HAVE DRIVEN THESE MEN NOT ONLY OUT OF PUBLIC LIFE BUT ALSO OUT OF NEW BRUNSWICK--AND I WANT TO TELL YOU GENTLEMEN THE END IS NOT YET.

EMBEZZLEMENT CHARGED.

"Public charges have been laid in the newspapers that Mr. Berry embezzled \$2,993 paid to him by the Dalhousie Lumber Company some time in August, 1912. We know what became of that money, we know where it went and we challenge Mr. Clarke to arrest Mr. Berry and put him in court and when he does he will know what became of the money. WORLD TO CORRUPT THE ELECTORATE AND PUT THE MONEY IN THEIR OWN POCKETS.

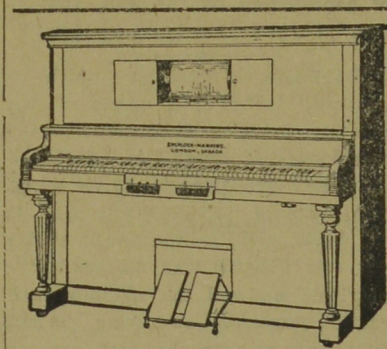
"I am not condoning Mr. Berry's actions. I only want to put this matter in its true light and I think I know whereof I speak. WAR MAPS IN
SEALED PACKAGES

A new phase of German preparedness for war is disclosed in an article in the latest number of Collier's Weekly by Norman Draper. He writes: "Each German warship's commander had in his possession a sealed package. When he received it he was told that the package was not to be opened under any circumstances unless Germany went to war. In it found among other things, a map of the world.

"On this map, at what represented remote and untraveled parts of the oceans, he found little black dots. At other parts of the chart he found tiny crosses marked with red ink. A key that accompanied the map informed him that the black dots represented spots where coal, provisions and men to complete the complement of his command might be found. One of the red crosses marked the spot in the ocean he must hurry to with all possible speed. Others marked spots where the warships were to mobilize or where he was to go if he could not reach the first cross.

"Now consider the German merchantmen who sped away at the first intimation of a possible war. Out of sight of land they scattered, each in a different direction. The commander of each vessel, a member of the German naval reserve, also had in his possession a map of the world, which had been furnished him by the government. On it he found no crosses in red ink and but one black dot on the areas of green representing the sea. That dot was his objective. And he crowded on all steam to get there. Then he settled himself down to await developments.

"Generally developments came quickly in the shape of a long gray warship, the Prussian naval flag whipping the mast at its stern and a forced draft spurring a column of

"If the warship needed a small quantity of coal it secured it from the anchored merchantman and went on its way. If it needed a large quantity of coal or provisions and men to bring the crew up to a war basis, the coal and provisions and men and anything else of value were transferred from the merchantman to the war vessel."
