bringing a superior force to bear.

"The site of the battle suggests that Admiral Von Spee had found the Pacific too hot for him, and had rounded Cape Horn in order to enter the Atlantic, possibly with the view of linking up with the Karlsruhe, but that the British outlook vessels in the neighborhood of Cape Horn observed his movements and wirelessed to the British patrolling squadron in time to intercept him.

"The Dresden, Ndrnberg and Karlsruhe are now possibly the only German cruisers on the high seas. They are all small, swift vessels, which need to be rounded up in the interests of commerce. Possibly the Bremen should be added to their number, but there is some doubt about her locality. There are also at least two German armed liners to be accounted for, one of them, the Kronprinz Wilhelm, possessing high speed.

"The crushing victory justifies our hoping that the methods now employed by the admiralty on the basis of their war experience and under the masterly direction of Lord Fisher, will before long lay these remaining raiders by the heels. Their temporary immunity has depended upon certain resources, especially the abuse of the wireless telegraph and violation of the neutrality of the coastal states, which must, as time goes on, be restricted within ever narrowing limits."

TURKISH COMMANDER SURRENDERS

London, Dec. 9.—It is officially announced that Subhi Bey, late governor of Basra, Asiatic Turkey, commander of the Turkish forces at Kurna, yesterday surrendered unconditionally with his troops to the Indian expeditionary force which is operating at the head of the Persian Gulf. Kurna, subsequently, was occupied by the British who are now in complete control of the country from the junction of the Tigris and Euphrates rivers to the sea and of the richest part of the fertile Delta.

THE FIGHTING

London, Dec. 9.—The Indian office in a despatch describing the operations of the British forces on the Persian Gulf says:

"A reconnaissance of the enemy's position at Kurna was made on December 5 by Colonel G. S. Fraser, with the 110th Mahratta Light Infantry. The enemy was encountered on the left bank of the Tigris, opposite Kurna. They were promptly attacked and driven across the river, losing heavily. Two guns and seventy prisoners, including three Turkish officers, were captured.

"Kurna was found to be strongly held by guns and infantry, and the British finding no means of crossing the Tigris, withdrew to their original positions.

"The following day reinforcements were sent from Basra under Brigadier General Fry, and captured Masara, cleared the left bank of the Tigris and took three guns and one hundred prisoners, including three officers.

"On December 8, the British crossed the river, and the next day Subhi Bey surrendered.

"The British losses during the whole of these operations amounted to one British officer killed and three wounded, with forty Indians of the rank and file killed, and one hundred and twenty wounded."

OFFICIAL STATEMENTS

Paris, Dec. 9.—The following official communication was issued tonight:

"There are no other incidents of importance to report than an advance by our troops before Parvillers (Department of the Somme) and a German attack upon Tracy-Le-Val (Department of the Oise) which was repulsed."

AUSTRIAN

Berlin, 9, by wireless to London.—The Austrian general staff today published the following communication in Vienna:

"In Eastern Galicia the fight again is becoming very stubborn. In the west our troops attacked and caused the enemy to withdraw from his position between Dobezyc and Wieliczka (southeast of Cracow). It has not yet been possible to ascertain the total number of prisoners taken. So far over five thousand have been captured, among them being twenty-seven officers.

"In Poland renewed Russian attacks to the south of Piotrkow everywhere have been repulsed by the Austro-Hungarian troops.

"Nothing of note occurred in the Carpathians. The Russian troops again have been compelled to retire behind the mountain ridges."

HUNGARIAN.

Amsterdam, via London, Dec. 10.—An official report received here from Budapest says numerous actions have taken place in which the Russians in some cases were forced across the Galtian border and in others repulsed.
