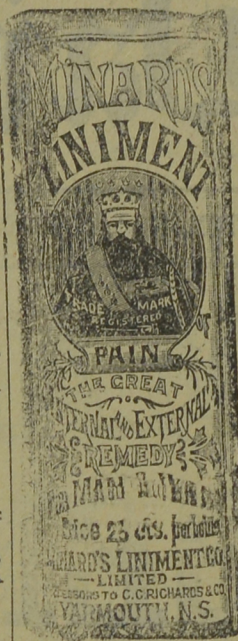

HAPPY CONVICTS

A Swiss prison appears to be the
very place in which to spend a cheap
holiday, as you have practically all
you want--a comfortable cell, central
heating, electricity, good food, a fair
quantity of wine or beer and tobacco,
and a library. You can learn a trade,
have plenty of exercise, and there is
little work to do in return for all
these advantages. Until a year ago,
at Thorberg Prison, good conduct
prisoners were even allowed out once
a week on "parole," but, though no
prisoners escaped, this custom has
been suppressed.

Of all the Swiss prisons perhaps
the jolliest is that of Kreuzlingen, in
the Canton of Thurgau. The inmates
have weekly smoking concerts, where
the latest music hall songs can be
heard, and good music, with the result
that at evenings the townspeople--
Kreuzlingen has nearly 6,000 inhabi-
tants--gather enviously under the
prison walls and promenade in the
street enjoying the free entertain-
ment, especially as some of the con-
victs have good voices. On these oc-
casions there is no warden to prevent
a conversation between the prisoner
and their visitors across the wall, and
thus the former learn the latest news.
It is noticed that the prisoners are
very polite when young women are
present. Pockets of cigarettes and
other small luxuries--not on the regu-
lar menu--and their way over the
walls, and this custom, though strictly
forbidden, is winked at. These plea-
sant little "soirées musicales" are no
threatened with extinction.

population increases, in the country.

RAID DAIRY LUNCH TAKES ALL ITS FOOD

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 22--Two hun-
dred unemployed men terrorized the
patrons and proprietors of a dairy
lunch at Second Avenue and Cherry
street last night by marching into the
place and forcibly taking all the food
in sight. After this raid, they par-
aded the down-town streets and made
an onslaught on a market, seizing
everything edible within reach. Forty
men arrested and placed in three
large cells at the city jail, kicked the
plaster off the walls and broke all
the windows. Then a volley of the
pieces of plaster brought the big gas
light globes crashing to the floor, leav-
ing the corridor in darkness.

The men said they had agreed not
to go to the Hotel Liberty, the munici-
pal home for men without jobs, be-
cause they would be required to cut
wood, mop the floors, cook and per-
form other service.

The mob formed on Washington
street and dragged an express wagon
through the streets bearing placards
advertising their state of unemploy-
ment.

The men arrested offered Industrial
Workers of the World literature to
the patrolmen.
