

NORTH SYDNEY WOMAN MURDERED IN HER HOME

North Sydney, N.S., Dec. 21—Miss Dunn, one of the best known residents of this town, was murdered in her residence on Queen street about six o'clock this evening. A negro named West who lives opposite on the same street is held on suspicion.

Miss Dunn was found in a kneeling posture at the bottom of the stairs leading into the cellar. A deep gash in the head and a bloody axe nearby told the nature of the tragedy. Life was extinct when the body was found.

The discovery was made by Adam Ross. On reaching home in the evening he found the table laid for supper but nobody in the house. After waiting for some time he began a search which finally led him to the cellar stairs and he was horrified to find Miss Dunn's prostrate body at the bottom, her head in a pool of blood. Beside her was the axe used by the murderer. Mr. Ross at once summoned Dr. Rindress and soon after the police authorities were notified. An examination of the body by Doctors Rindress and J. W. McLean disclosed the fact that death must have been instantaneous.

Later in the evening the Coroner empaneled a jury and viewed the body and examined the premises. It was found that the murder must have been

committed in the sitting room and the body afterwards carried down into the basement. Beside the axe, a piece of broken water pipe with blood and hair upon it was also discovered. This instrument possibly dealt the first blow. Blood was also found upon the knob of the front door which would indicate that the murderer left the house by the main entrance. The back door was found to be locked. There was evidence also of a struggle in the sitting room.

Suspicion rests upon the colored man West owing to the fact that he frequently went to Miss Dunn's house for water, and on his own admission had been there at five o'clock this evening.

The amazing part of the crime is the complete absence of motive. There was no evidence of robbery in

the house, Miss Dunn's jewelry was untouched.

The inquest has been adjourned until eleven o'clock tomorrow. The body was taken to the undertaking rooms to await the completion of the investigation.

Miss Dunn who was highly respected, was about 70 years of age and had been a life long resident of North Sydney. She conducted, for many years the jewelry business which had belonged to her father, and which some years ago she sold to A. W. Ross.

BIG WARS CAUSED BY MINOR AFFAIRS

Events, Trifling in Themselves, Have Sent Nations Armed Against Nations in Conflict

A Mexican refusal to fire a salute of twenty-one guns seems an absurd trifle to sacrifice human life for, but that affair provided but another illustration of the manner in which little sparks sometimes bring about big international blazes. The war in which Great Britain lost the United States for example, began because the citizens of Boston emptied a number of tea chests into Boston harbor. The objected to having their tea taxed for the benefit of England, and showed their resentment by tipping it into the sea. The result was that hostilities began at once.

And it was really because a few people lost their heads in the excitement of the moment that South Carolina began the war between North and South in the sixties. While negotiations regarding the slavery question were in progress the North sent a ship to reinforce the garrison at Fort Sumter. The South Carolina Secessionists saw the ship arriving and gave into a fever of excitement. The thought it was a sign that hostilities had begun, with the consequence that they fired at the ship, bombarded the garrison, and took all the men in the fort prisoners, for the garrison was quite unprepared. It was this little affair which which precipitated matters, set the North ablaze, and resulted in the war which cost the States \$10,000,000,000 and the lives of 600,000 men.

Religion and War

The question of the guardianship of the Holy Sepulchre really led to disastrous Crimean War. France had it; Russia wanted it; and Great Britain sent a messenger to ask Russia to withdraw. But the messenger was ultimately informed that the Russian Emperor had nothing to reply and a few days later an enormous crowd gathered in front of the Royal Exchange in London to hear war declared.

It was quite a trifling affair which led to the conflict between Russia and Turkey in 1877, a war which was really originated by the blow of a blacksmith's hammer. In the seven ties the province of Bosnia and Herzegovina, long under Turkish rule but now under the administration of Austria-Hungary, was groaning under the excessive taxation levied by the Turks. In some parts of the province all persons over the age of sixteen had to pay a poll tax.

One day a collector went to a small mountain village to collect the tax when a dispute arose between him and the village blacksmith concerning the age of the latter's daughter. The blacksmith insisted that she was a minor, and when the tax-collector made some insulting remark about her the smith brained him with his hammer. The blow of that hammer was heard in every Court in Europe for the smith fled to the mountains taking his daughter with him, gathered a band of malcontents, and began an insurrection which set the whole province in a blaze. The war spread to Servia, and ultimately Russia became involved.

"Jenkins's Ear"

An extraordinary affair, which descended in history as that of "Jenkins's ear," led to the war between Britain and Spain in 1739. At that time the Spaniards, encouraged by a secret compact with France, began to exercise with great severity their right to search English vessels on the high seas. In 1731 an English merchant vessel was boarded by the Spanish guardship and the captain, named Robert Jenkins, was cruelly used. After his release Captain Jenkins made his way to England, where the story of his torture by the Spaniards, and the tearing off of one of his ears, aroused general anger. Seven years later he was called before Parliament, and standing at the Bar of the House, retold his narrative to the assembled members. His story caused a thrill of indignation to run through England and war ensued.—Tit-Bits.

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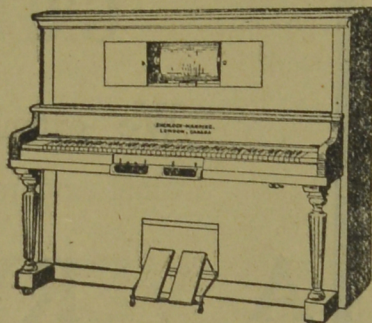
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
