KNOCKING MR. PINDER

Our old friend Mr. J. K. Pinder, M. P., seems to be getting some hard knocks these days from the McLeod faction of the party, some of whom go so far as to say that it would be little short of a crime to take him into the provincial cabinet in view of recent developments. It may be said with truth of Mr. Pinder that he is no better than he pretends to be. He is neither a saint nor a Sunday School worker and he has, so far as we know, never posed as such. Mr. Pinder, during his long public career, has undoubtedly been mixed up in some queer transactions and, worst of all, it has been his great misfortune to be found out. The people of York know all about his record, yet on four different occasions they have elected him to the local legislature. In season and out of season he has worked hard for the Tory party and now that his political friends are in control of the affairs of the province, the old gentleman, no doubt, feels that he is fairly entitled to a share of the loaves and fishes. During the past few years he may have gathered up a few odd baskets full of the remnants of the Tory feast but he has had no chance to operate on the inside of the government fence, where the pasture is much wider. Mr. Pinder, like the immortal Caesar, is ambitious and even though he may differ from Brutus in one important characteristic, there is no reason why he should be lampooned by the members of his own party at a time when he is in sight of the promised land.

Mr. Pinder may be dishonest as some allege, but we believe he is sufficiently honest to become a member of the Flemming government. Indeed, we believe that if the fierce white light of publicity, which has been beating on Mr. Pinder's unsophisticated head of late, was suddenly diverted to certain members and ex-members of the present government, the King of the Neckawick would not be unduly embarrassed by a comparison of his record with theirs. To put the whole matter in a nutshell, he is no worse and perhaps no better than the others. As The Mail has frequently pointed out, they are all tarred with the same stick and so long as it is the government's policy to squander and waste public money, Mr. Pinder would be rather slow in view of his long experience at the game if he did not get a share of what is going. When Mr. Pinder started in to build his railway line the business-like local government gave him a bond guarantee of \$10,000 a mile or a total of \$150,000. When the road was completed Mr. Pinder made another raid on the treasury and the sanctimonious Premier Flemming, without going to the trouble of enquiring as to how much the line had actually cost, came across with another \$25,000. Therefore, if there has been a steal of public funds as alleged, Premier Flemming as the sworn guardian of the public treasury, is just as much responsible for it as Mr. Pinder. The only cause for thankfulness is that Mr. Pinder should have been so modest in his demands and probably his himself regrets it now. Had he on the occasion of his second raid, demanded \$50,000 or \$100,000, he would probably have got it just as quickly as he did the smaller sum.

We are not surprised that some Tories should be anxious to keep Mr. Pinder out of the government, but we are more than surprised that Mr. Pinder, with all his native shrewdness and newly acquired fame as a railway builder, should for a moment seriously entertain a proposal to closely associate himself with such a kindergarten outfit. If Mr. Pinder possesses anything in the shape of a reputation which he wishes to hand down to posterity, our advice to him is to keep out of the Flemming government by all means. If he should be weak enough to allow himself to be roped in, the chances are he would be as bad as the rest of them before the close of the next session of the legislature.

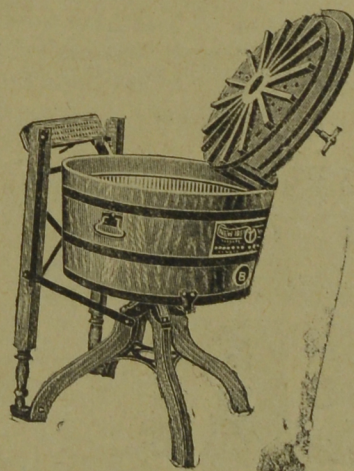
