KNOCKING MR. PINDER

Our old friend Mr. J. K. Pinder, M. P.P., seems to be getting some hard knocks these days from the McLeod faction of the party, some of whom go so far as to say that it would be little short of a crime to take him into the provincial cabinet in view of recent developments. It may be said with truth of Mr. Pinder that he is no better than he pretends to be. He is neither a saint not a Sunday School worker and he has, so, far as we know, never posed as such. Mr. Pinder, during his long public career, has undoubtedly been mixed up in some queer transactions and, worst of all, it has been his great misfortune to be found out. The people of York know all about his record, yet on four different occasions they have elected him to the local legislature. In season and out of season he has worked hard for the Tory party and now that his political friends are in control of the affairs of the province, the old gentleman, no doubt, feels that he it fairly entitled to a share of the loaves and fishes. During the past few years he may have gathered friends to a genuine surprise. up a few odd baskets full of the remnants of the Tory feast but he has had no chance to operate on the inside of the government fence, where the pasture is much wider. Mr. Pinder, like the immortal Ceazar, is ambitious and even though he may differ from Brutus in one important characteristic, there is no reason why he should be lampooned by the mem bers of his own party, at a time when he is in sight of the promised land.

Mr. Pinder may be dishonest as some allege, but we believe he is sufficiently monest to become a member of the Flemming government. Indeed, we believe that if the fierce white light of publicity, which has been beating on Mr. Pinder's unsophisticated head of late, was suddenly diverted to certain members and ex-mem bers of the present government, the King of the Nackawick would not be unduly embarrassed by a comparison of his record with theirs.
