to have a school building with eight class rooms, erected on the lot recently acquired on Smythe street, with as little delay as possible."

To which Mr. Sharley moved in amendment:

"That before taking decisive action in erecting an exclusively elementary grade school building, this Board, in view of the public demand for technical in the common schools, appoint a committee to take means to ascertain the nature of the aid likely to be offered by the federal government to technical education so that the Board may be in a position, while relieving the congestion complained of, by devoting the present High School building wholly to the common grades, to also confer the desired boon to industrial education upon the school service of the city."

MOTION CARRIED.

After an extended discussion upon the motion and amendment, the chairman then put the amendment, when it was declared lost.

The question upon the original was now taken when it was decided carried.

Upon motion of Mr. Lemont, the following committee was then appointed to take all preliminary steps for the erection of the building:

The chairman, Mr. Sterling, Mr. Weddall and Dr. Crockett.

SALARY QUESTION.

Mrs. Clark, from a committee, submitted a statement showing the salary paid to teachers in all the principal cities and towns of the province, but the committee made no recommendation.

After consideration the committee was continued and requested to make a further report, with recommendation, at the next regular meeting of the Board.

During the session Mr. Weddall exhibited views of public buildings in Woodstock, including the Broadway School building, which he thought was approximate to the kind of structure just now needed in Fredericton.
