

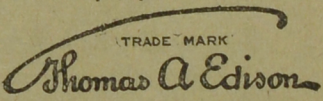

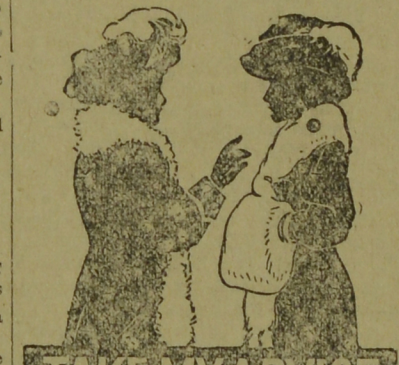

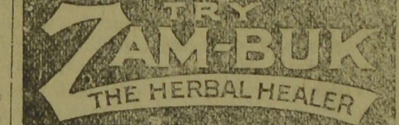
FRANK SMITH MANAGER OF BALTIMORE FEDERALS

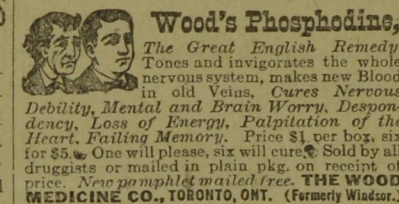
