COL. J. L. MARSH

West End saw mill, destroyed by fire some time ago.

EDUCATION.

Col. Marsh received his primary education in this city and after attending the Collegiate School, entered Sackville Academy, when it was first established. Among his classmates were Hon. A. R. McClellan, afterward lieutenant governor of New Brunswick, and W. H. Tuck, late chief justice. He afterward was a student at the Baptist Seminary, which stood upon the site of the present High School, and from that institution matriculated into King's College, now the University of New Brunswick. He was graduated from that college in 1882 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts and now is its oldest graduate.

ENTERED LEGAL PROFESSION.

After leaving college Col. Marsh took up the study of law, being entered as a student in the office of the late Charles Fisher. He was sworn in as attorney April 16, 1883. He was succeeded as clerk in the office of the late Mr. Fisher by the late D. L. Hannington, afterward judge of the Supreme Court. In 1884 he was sworn in as a barrister.

PART IN POLITICS.

In his early years the present police magistrate took a prominent place in civic and provincial politics and was noted as a campaigner in York county in pre-Confederation days. While practising law he entered the City Council, being elected alderman for St. Anne's Ward by acclamation in 1862 and 1863. In the latter year he resigned his seat at the council to succeed the late George N. Segee as city clerk.

CAREER IN OFFICE.

At that time Col. Marsh was a member of the legal firm of Marsh & Beckwith, the other member being Charles W. Beckwith. In 1871 legislation was enacted creating the office of police magistrate and on May 2 of that year he was appointed to that office, being sworn in upon the day following. He was succeeded as city clerk by his partner, Mr. Beckwith, the partnership of course, coming to an end. During his long career as magistrate Col. Marsh has tried or conducted examinations in many noted cases. He tried the first case under the Canada Temperance Act, commonly known as the Scott Act. An appeal was made from his judgment in that case and Col. Marsh had the satisfaction of having his judgment sustained by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council. In 1903, on the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of his admission as an attorney, the members of the bar in Fredericton presented Col. Marsh with an address and a silver water-pitcher, tray and goblet. The presentation was made by Dr. J. D. Phinney, K.C., senior member of the bar.

IN THE MILITIA.

Col. Marsh has had a long and distinguished career in the militia and is one of a very few officers who have served not only in the Canadian forces but also in the provincial militia, which existed before Confederation. In 1859 Col. Marsh, then captain of No. 4 Engine Company of the Fredericton Fire Department, used that organization as the nucleus of a company of militia known as the City Rifles. Col. Marsh was lieutenant in that company, the late John McDonald being captain. This corps was formed to receive the Prince of Wales, afterward Edward VII, upon his visit to Fredericton in 1850 and was part of the guard of honor upon that occasion. Col. Marsh carried the Queen's Color and the late Enoch B. Chestnut the Regimental Color. Col. Marsh frequently refers to the fact that reports of the reception accorded the Prince in this city, published in English newspapers, stated that "the colors were swept with military precision."

On December 10, 1861, Capt. McDonald retired and was succeeded by Lieut. Marsh. In 1866 part of the company was on active service in the First Fenian Raid. The remainder of the corps, under command of Capt. Marsh, was under orders in Fredericton. The colonel wears the Fenian Raid Medal on that account. On December 27, 1867, the City Rifles were disbanded and their commander was appointed major in the 1st York Battalion, New Brunswick Militia. In the same year Confederation took place and all officers of provincial militia were placed on the reserve, pending reorganization of the military forces. He was senior major of the reserve militia of York County, until September 10, 1869, when he was appointed senior major of the 1st Battalion of the Canadian Militia, now the 71st York Regiment. He became lieutenant colonel November 2, 1871, succeeding the late Lt. Col. John Hewitson. For upwards of twenty-three years he commanded the corps, being retired with his rank February 9, 1895, an order being made that tenure of command of a corps should not exceed five years, unless specially extended. He was granted the Colonial Officers' Auxiliary Forces Decoration.

with the Fameuse, Macintosh Red, Wealthy, New Brunswick and Dudley varieties of apples. The report was referred to a special committee.

DOMINION FRUIT CONFERENCE.

The election of delegates to the Fourth Dominion Fruit Conference, to be held at Ottawa in mid-summer of the present year, was proceeded with. The association now is entitled to three delegates in addition to those representing the provincial department, New Brunswick now being on the same basis as the upper provinces.

The election resulted as follows:
Delegates—C. N. Vroom, S. B. Hatheway, W. B. Gilman.
Substitutes—J. W. Clarke, Henry A. Wilnot, Herbert Smith.
Amendments to constitution and bylaws proposed at the last annual meeting were balloted on and adopted.

A nominating committee composed of S. B. Hatheway, J. W. Clarke, S. L. Peters and James Barnes was appointed to report this afternoon, when the officers will be elected.

S. L. PETERS' ADDRESS.

S. L. Peters, Dominion fruit inspector, delivered a very instructive address upon "The Amended Conditions Under Which Apples Are to be Placed on the Market with Reference to Marketing and Packing." Mr. Peters quoted from the Dominion Act governing this and gave a considerable amount of information.

In reply to S. B. Hatheway, it was said that there appeared to be nothing in the act to prevent the use of paper labels to mark fruit. Mr. Hatheway also mentioned the importance of small fruits as an intercrop in producing dividends from new orchards. The great necessity of the farmer at the present time was a market. The situation now was too uncertain.

In reply it was stated that Boston and Montreal fruit furnished a market at the present time for strawberries.

The report of the treasurer, Henry A. Wilnot, was received and referred to S. L. Peters and Charles Fulton as auditors.

HIS FAMILY.

Col. Marsh was married November 3, 1859, to Miss Hester Schuyler Frink, daughter of the late Schuyler Frink. His wife died April 13, 1900. Two daughters survive, Mrs. G. Ernest Powers of Boston, and Miss Mary Marsh of this city. She was of Loyalist ancestry.
