ANNUAL MEETING
LAST NIGHT

Important Matters to Come Before
Congregation During Year---Finances
In Satisfactory Condition---New
Trustees Elected

The annual meeting of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church was held last night and was largely attended. Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith presided. The usual reports were presented and officials were chosen. The financial position of the church was reported to be sound. During the ensuing year two very important matters will come before the congregation. These are the adoption of free pews in the church and the wearing of caps and gowns by the choir.

ELECTION OF TRUSTEES.

The election of trustees to serve for a term of three years resulted in the choice of the following:—Fletcher Peacock, Wm. M. Burns, George W. Hodge and George R. Perkins.

Samuel Mackey was elected to fill the vacancy on the trustee board caused by the removal from the city of Willard Kitchen.

Lt.-Col. T. G. Loggie presented the report of the trustees. The report showed total receipts from collections, pew rents, etc., in 1913 to be \$4,336.07 compared with \$4,480.96 in 1912. During the year a joint meeting of session and trustees had been held, at which it was decided that an additional \$1,000 for current expenses and \$400 should be raised. An ap-

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COL. J. L. MARSH
CELEBRATING 85th
BIRTHDAY TODAY

Veteran Police Magistrate Has Had
Interesting Career---Prominent in
Militia Circles---Facts Concern-
ing His Long Life

Lt.-Col. John L. Marsh, police magistrate of Fredericton, today is celebrating his eighty-fifth birthday. His Honor was not present at this morning's session of the police court however, sitting Magistrate J. W. McCready presiding. The colonel is in good health however, and bears well the combined weight of years and duties.

FACTS OF LIFE.

John Lothrop Marsh was born at the place now known as Middle Simonds, Camleton county, January 22, 1829. His father was John Lothrop Marsh, Sr., a native of Sheffield, Sunbury county, and of loyalist descent. His mother was Julia Louise LeBrun Beckwith, daughter of the late Nehemiah Beckwith. His mother was of French descent and a cousin of Abbe Ferland, afterward historian of Quebec, and at that time priest in charge of a nunnery in that city in which she received her education. The abbess was her aunt. The parents of Col. Marsh were united in marriage in the Anglican Cathedral in Quebec by His Lordship Bishop Mountain. After taking up his residence in Fredericton the father of Col. Marsh engaged in the manufacture of lumber, building Fredericton's first steam sawmill on the site of the

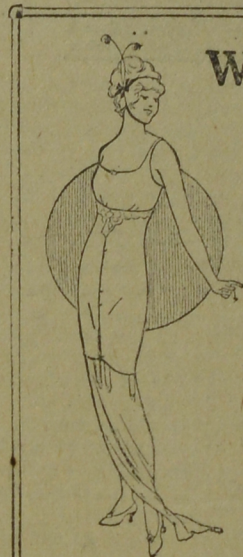

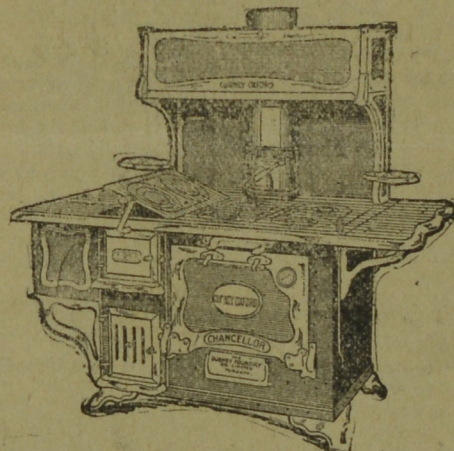
