ITALY MAY ENTER WAR

GERMANS LOST HEAVILY

Rome, Nov. 26.—A despatch to the "Giornale d'Italia" says that in the new German retirement from Poland the invaders lost one fourth of their effective forces. Communication between the Austrian and German armies is declared to have been definitely broken off and the Russians are marching on Breslau, Posen and Thorn with great rapidity.

TO SUPPRESS FOOTBALL MATCHES.

London, Nov. 25.—Premier Asquith will be asked in the House of Commons tomorrow if he will introduce legislation suppressing all professional football matches during the continuance of the war.

Paris, November 25.—Grand Duke Michael of Russia has presented to the French army 1,000,000 pairs of shoes which had been ordered from Webster (Mass.) factories at an average price of \$3 per pair. Some enormous orders for shoes for the Russian army have also been placed in America.

DECORATED BY KAISER.

Berlin November 25, via The Hague.—Emperor William has conferred the Iron Cross of the first and second class on Archduke Charles Francis of Austria, commander-in-chief of the Austrian army and heir apparent to the Austro-Hungarian throne, for the part he has taken in the military operations.

IN EGYPTIAN CAMPAIGN.

Paris, November, 26.—A despatch to the Havas Agency from Athens says private letters received in the Greek capital from Constantinople are to the effect that Djemal Pasha, former Turkish minister of the interior has been appointed commander-in-chief of the Turkish forces operating against Egypt.

FLOODED WITH THE WOUNDED.

Vienna, November, 25, via Venice to London, Nov. 25.—Wounded soldiers from Serbia are pouring into Hungary in such numbers that nearly all the school buildings in the country have been requisitioned for their accommodation. The few schools in Vienna which previously had been permitted to give instructions two hours daily, also have been commandeered for the wounded.

The Hungarian minister of the interior has ordered the police throughout the country to prepare an accurate list of all enemy aliens in their districts.

DIFFICULT TASK.

Berlin, via London, Nov. 25.—The Berlin Tageblatt prints a letter from Prince Von Buelow, the ex-chancellor, in which he expresses the fear that the war will "prove a very difficult task or Germany."

AUSTRIANS AND GERMANS FIGHT

Lemberg, Galicia, November, 25.—The sound of firing which was said to be the result of a clash between the Germans and Austrians composing the garrison of Przemyśl, was reported by the refugees arriving here today from the vicinity of the Austrian fortress.

The sound came from the fortifications on the interior line, and was audible for a distance of two miles. At first it was believed that the troops had fired on mutinous inhabitants in Przemyśl, but later the refugees say the above cause was learned.

It was further reported that the Germans had hanged the commandant of the fortress because he proposed to surrender the citadel. The Austrians are said to have opposed the measures put into effect by the Germans, which resulted in a pitched battle in the streets.

Wounded Austrians returning from the Carpathians and from the south of Lemberg report that the Austrians are retreating in utter defeat. Their losses are said to have been very heavy, and to have included 6,000 prisoners and all the supplies. Toward Cracow, the retreat is said to have

KAISER LOST COAT.

Petrograd, Nov. 25.—via London.—The Army Messenger asserts that among the trophies taken by the Russians at Czenstochowa was the Emperor William's carriage, and that in it was the Emperor's blue coat.

Dealing with the fighting north of Lodz the Army Messenger says:

"The Germans are making attack after attack in an attempt to break the Russian forces, but without success. The Austro-German army is staking all on this battle."

The newspaper adds that on the Galician front the Russian offensive is becoming more energetic and is reducing the enemy to a state of impotence.

ONE DIVISION CAPTURED

London, Nov. 26.—"The action near Lodz," says the Daily Mail's Petrograd correspondent, "resulted in a great Russian victory. One division of Germans already has surrendered and another is in such a hopeless position that it is expected to surrender immediately."

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

that they had not come with any desire to criticize any action of the trustees, but owing to the continuous reports of sickness among children attending the Charlotte Street School they felt that perhaps more drastic steps should be taken by the Board of Health to stamp out scarlet fever in the city and thought the trustees could aid in this matter. He felt that with the authority possessed by the Board of Health this condition of things should not exist. Mr. McLellan endorsed the statements made by Mr. Shipp and said that as parents they were naturally deeply interested that proper protection should be extended to their children. They should not be exposed to danger by contact with children coming from homes where scarlet fever or any contagious disease exists. Mrs. Chestnut and Mrs. Deedes also addressed the trustees, and after a general expression of views, the chairman assured the delegates that this matter would receive very careful attention from the Board. He will discuss the matter with the Board of Health at a meeting to be held today.

A communication was read from the chief superintendent of education acknowledging the receipt of the annual report of the Board. Several letters were read from parties willing to supply furniture for the new school building and these were filed with others of a like character. A dozen applications, more or less, were read from teachers in different parts of the province, asking for a position on the Board's teaching staff. The names were entered on the applicants' book.

Letters were read from two teachers, asking that when the trustees arrange to transfer teachers to the new Smythe Street School, that they be allowed to retain their present positions. This was, perhaps, a little surprise to the trustees, as it was thought there might be a scramble among the teachers for transfer to this splendidly appointed building with everything up-to-date. The Recent Street School committee was authorized to provide some extra accommodation for the large number of children who remain in the building at noon for luncheon. Mr. Weddall was authorized to arrange for fitting the Smythe Street School with window blinds, etc.

Mr. Lemont, from committee, submitted an extended report upon the plans for opening the Smythe Street School building after the Christmas vacation. It has not yet been decided whether four or six departments will be placed there. Suggestions were also made respecting necessary changes to be made in the High School building and other matters which will receive attention at an adjourned meeting to be held in a few days.
