INTERESTING LETTER

FROM A. N. CARTER

In a recent letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Carter of Rothesay, Arthur N. Carter, writing from the training camp in England of the King Edward Horse, to which he and the other Canadian Rhodes' scholars are attached, speaks of the impatience of the collegians to get to the front and do something. This, he said, was the characteristic attitude of all who enlisted. Many of the Oxford men, he said, had accepted commissions, but that would entail a longer sojourn in England, and perhaps continuous drilling of recruits. Messrs. Reid and Dyde, Rhodes' men from Nova Scotia and Alberta, were going to remain as long as himself in the K.E.H. and get some experience at the front. Curiously enough, both Reid and Dyde, though representing other provinces at Oxford, are New Brunswickers, the former hailing from Carleton county, and Dyde is a son of Doctor Dyde, once a well known professor at the University of New Brunswick.

Commenting upon the delay in getting to the front, Mr. Carter said everyone had implicit confidence in the minister of war, Kitchener, and their personal feelings must give way to his plan of campaign, but there was an impression that, while the German fleet avoided a fight, England would not be left without plenty of troops to repel a possible raid on the coast.

At the present time with the lines of communication comparatively short in Belgium and France, there was not the same necessity for mounted infantry and cavalry that there would be later.

While no one in England apparently had any doubt of the result of the war, and the victory of the Allies, still the idea that the conflict would be brief was never put forward now.

WHAT WILL BECOME OF PREMIER FLEMMING

(St. John Globe.)

The present week is expected to bring publication of the reports of the Royal Commission that investigated the Dugal charges and of Commissioner Chandler with reference to the St. John police force. Following these there is almost certain to be changes in the New Brunswick cabinet and in the head of the St. John police force. While there has been unexplained secrecy about these reports, it is generally admitted that the findings of the commissioners with reference to the Valley Railway construction work are so direct that it will be impossible for the lieutenant governor to longer recognize the present head of the government. Also, it is said the report of Commissioner Chandler so strongly supports the charge of the City Council that the government will not longer object to the demand that the control of the department be handed over to the city. In view of the early publication of these reports there is much speculation as to the future of the two men most directly interested, the premier of New Brunswick and the chief of police. It is quite within the bounds of possibilities that the lieutenant governor, when he submits the Dugal commission report to the government, will also make public some statement from Premier Flemming which will disclose his intentions. An interesting political rumor mentions Hon. J. K. Flemming's name as a possible successor to the late Mr. A. Bowden, as New Brunswick agent in England. There is no question about the ability of Hon. Mr. Flemming to all such a position but the wisdom of any such appointment will best be discussed after the finding of the commission on the recent charges is made known. As regards the chief of police it may be assumed that a suggestion for a retiring allowance will be favorably considered by the city which he has served for twenty-five years.

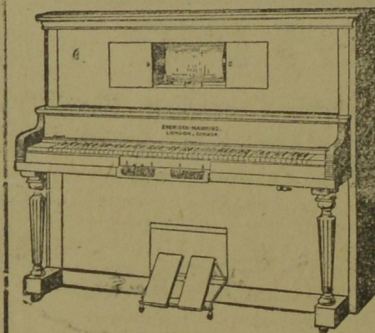

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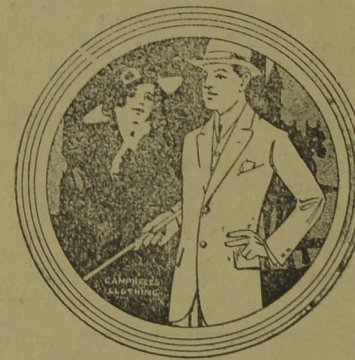
