Carvell added that he had formerly been a solicitor.

Q.—Is not that a payment to Mr. Winslow and charged up to Mr. Gould?
A.—It looks that way.

Q.—Do you know of any draft for that amount which Mr. Winslow had with the company?
A.—Not that I know of.

THE BEST WITNESS.

Mr. Carvell—I don't think it would be amiss to say here that you are the best witness we have had for a month. You are, I think, honestly trying to answer all the questions you can. I wish we had a whole lot like you. (Laughter).

The next item was a check for \$1,000 to J. N. W. Winslow, "on account of services rendered in connection with the buying of rights-of-way etc." There was a draft attached accepted by the St. John & Quebec Construction Company per A. R. Gould.

The chairman asked if there was no itemised account for the amount.
Mr. Carvell said there was another itemised account for \$1,000 with Mr. Winslow but that that transaction stood by itself.

The Chairman—Is there an itemised account accompanying this?

A.—No, not that I have seen.
The draft was endorsed by J. N. W. Winslow, Kennedy & Macdonald and D. A. Macdonald.

Mr. Carvell—This is all charged up to right-of-way?

A.—Yes.
Q.—Did you receive instructions from Mr. Ross Thompson about that check?

A.—No, sir.
Q.—How did you happen to issue that check?

A.—I knew the draft was due and I made out the check for the amount and went to the bank.

Q.—The draft was made upon the St. John & Quebec Railway Company and not upon the construction company?

A.—Yes.
Q.—And paid by the construction company?

A.—Yes.
Q.—How can you account for that?

A.—I don't know how to account for it.
Q.—Do you think you would pay the railway company's drafts with construction company's funds without instructions?

A.—I certainly had instructions.

Witness then went on to give details of a check to J. N. W. Winslow, Woodstock, for services in connection with titles between Woodstock and Meductic for \$300.

Mr. Guthrie pointed out that the amount was not excessive as there was a lot of work to be done and Mr. Carvell stated that Mr. Winslow engaged a man to do the work for him and received the money from the company.

Answering Com. Fisher, the witness said that the check was charged to right-of-way in district C.

There was another check drawn in favor of Mr. Winslow for \$3,504.40, November 12, 1912, on account of agricultural land in the town of Woodstock. That was accompanied by a draft payable to the order of J. C. Hartley and charged to the account of J. N. W. Winslow.

Q.—Who was Hartley?
A.—I understand he is a lawyer of Woodstock.

NOT IN COMPANY'S NAME.

Q.—Then you do not know that the title is in the name of J. Norman W. Winslow and Mr. Ross Thompson?

A.—I do not.
Q.—All you know is that some one of this construction company paid \$3,504?

A.—Yes.
Q.—Do you know how much they agreed to pay for the whole amount of the ground?

A.—No.
Mr. Carvell next took the witness to a check to Lewis & Smilie, Ottawa, September 2, 1913, for \$1,235.

It was accompanied by a letter from A. R. Gould from Presque Isle to Mr. Ross Thompson asking that the amount of the check be forwarded as soon as the subsidy fund was available.

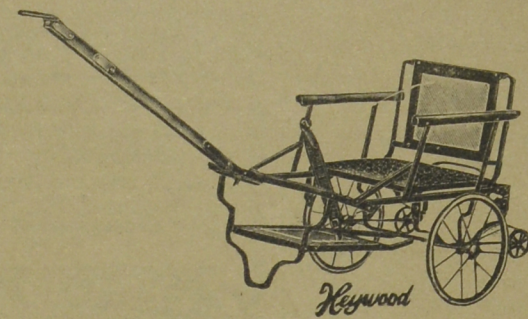
Q.—Who are Lewis & Smilie?
A.—They are the lawyers who look after the subsidy payments at Ottawa for the railway company?

Q.—Have you had to pay solicitors to look after the payment of the subsidy? I think you have a subsidy agreement with the government, have you not?

A.—Yes.
WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

one else. I went to Mr. McLeod's office with Mr. Scott and we talked it over. Mr. McLeod said that the contract was let without his consent, and told us about another piece of work on which he thought we could get the same prices, 20 cents and \$1.10. He said he thought there should be something in it for him, about \$100 a mile. Mr. Scott asked what I thought and I agreed to it.

HALF HIS WAY

Mr. Scott and my father looked over the work on the section. Mr. McLeod spoke of. When we saw Mr. McLeod again Mr. Scott held out for 27 cents and \$1.10. The extra cent figured up to \$3,000, and Mr. McLeod said he thought half of it ought to come his way. I said that would be satisfactory.

When we saw Mr. Hibbard, Mr. Scott told him our prices and Mr. Hibbard said, "Well John, some of your friends want you used right, so I'll give you these prices."

We went back and told Mr. McLeod about it and he seemed pleased. Mr. Scott asked if there was any way the engineers could get back at us. Mr. McLeod said "I'm provincial secretary and I'll see that they use you right, and I'll sign no—bonds for them until they do."

We spoke of the work, and he said we should not mind losing the other work and this would be as good as \$10,000 a piece for us, but we have not seen the \$10,000.

The witness said he knew that the \$1,500 was paid out of the firm's funds for this purpose, but could not say of his own knowledge that
