BOARD OF TRADE WON VICTORY OVER THE C. P. R.

Railway Commission Decides That the C. P. R. Must Not Discriminate Against Fredericton in Passenger Rates

The Railway Commission has handed down its decision on the passenger rate question, and that decision has been in favor of Fredericton. The decision is one of great importance to Fredericton as it means that in the future instead of exacting the sum of seventy cents on tickets sold by the Canadian Pacific railway from this city to points south and west over and above the charges from St. John the same rate must prevail from the two points.

The question was brought to the notice of the Railway Commission by the Local Board of Trade some weeks ago and the hearing took place at St. John in the spring. Mr. A. R. Slipp appeared as counsel for the Board, and was accompanied to St. John by Messrs. C. Fred Chestnut, R. F. Randolph and President J. D. Palmer. The whole matter was gone into thoroughly and the Commission was asked to have Fredericton placed on the same basis as St. John in regard to passenger rates. The railway authorities claimed that it was necessary to make the extra charge on the ground that Fredericton was on a branch railway line. But they had to admit that the distance from Fredericton to Western and American point was twenty-two miles shorter by way of Fredericton Junction than from St. John.

It is understood that the judgment of the Commission upholds the contention of Fredericton on every point.

FORMER ALDERMAN OF MARYSVILLE HURT ON I. R. C.

Eugene Savage Bridge Inspector on No. 2 Division, Thrown From Trolley Tuesday---Picked up Unconscious Near Rogersville

Eugene Savage, a few years ago an Alderman of Marysville, was seriously injured on Tuesday on the main line of the Intercolonial Railway and is now at his home in Newcastle, suffering much pain. Mr. Savage is bridge inspector on No. 2 Division of the I. R. C. While covering a portion of the division on a trolley on Tuesday he suffered the accident which resulted in the injuries mentioned.

Inspector Savage was found unconscious on a pile of stone beside the track. One shoulder was dislocated and he was very severely bruised and cut about the head and body. It is thought that the trolley while running at high speed jumped the rail.

Mr. Savage left Marysville a few weeks ago to take up his residence at Newcastle in order to be nearer his work. He was an Alderman at Marysville for two years and is a well known man. I. R. C. men and other friends are waiting anxiously for news of his recovery.

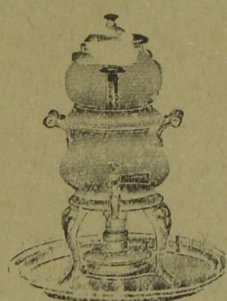
