

HUMAN OPERATION PERFORMED ON GAT

Veterinary Makes Unique Experimen to Save Tail of Feline

A unique operation was performed in Toronto when the fractured bones in the tail of a cat were sewn to gether with silver wire and the tendons caught and rejoined with rein-Saley, Rev. F. B., Mrs. M. Sanson, deer tendons. The operation was carried out in the same manner as if human bones were being treated, and the experiment is believed to be suc cessful. The operation is the first of its kind to be made in Canada, so far as is known. The cat, known as Prince, was caught in a swinging door. third joint and was set in splints. In Twicerd, Miss Jessie E., Grand some manner these became loosened and the setting was broken. Owing to the second accident it was almost impossible to save the tail, and it was then decided to operate upon the animal, treating the break in the same manner as human bones. Dr. Morphy Theodore, Mrs. W. J. Scott placed the feline under the X-rays, and, locating the position of the break, silver wire. The tendons were caught denimorth, Rev. F. H., Rev. A. F. and knotted with reindeer tendons and the opening restitched again. The flesh and fur were then sewn over the wound. The cat was placed under an anæsthetic for the operation which lasted about an hour.
