HUMAN OPERATION PERFORMED ON CAT

Veterinary Makes Unique Experiment to Save Tail of Feline

A unique operation was performed in Toronto when the fractured bones in the tail of a cat were sewn together with silver wire and the tendons caught and rejoined with reindeer tendons. The operation was carried out in the same manner as if human bones were being treated, and the experiment is believed to be successful. The operation is the first of its kind to be made in Canada, so far as is known. The cat, known as Prince, was caught in a swinging door. The feline's tail was broken at the third joint and was set in splints. In some manner these became loosened and the setting was broken. Owing to the second accident it was almost impossible to save the tail, and it was then decided to operate upon the animal, treating the break in the same manner as human bones. Dr. Morphy placed the feline under the X-rays, and, locating the position of the break, laid bare the tail bone and drilled through the joints in two places, stitching the fracture together with silver wire. The tendons were caught and knotted with reindeer tendons and the opening restitched again. The flesh and fur were then sewn over the wound. The cat was placed under an anæsthetic for the operation, which lasted about an hour.

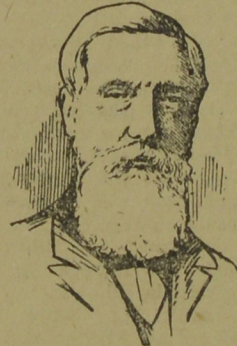
ARBITRATION CASE

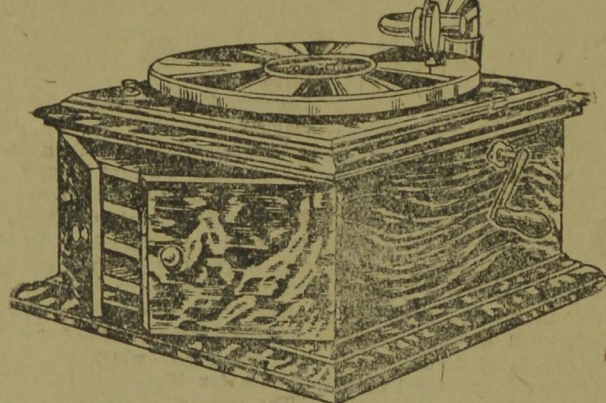

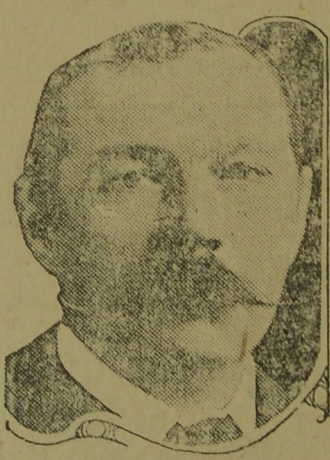

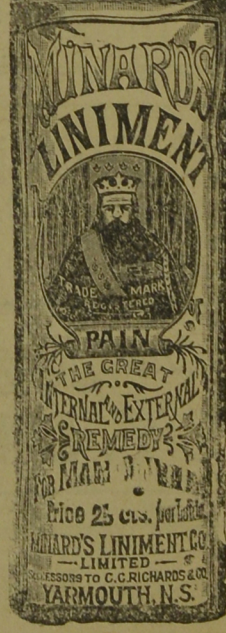
