DIED AT OROMOCTO.

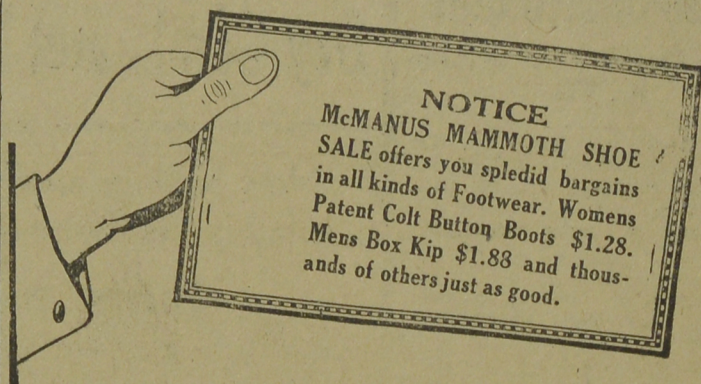

GENEROUS CONTRIBUTION FOR THE STRICKEN BELGIANS

Great Quantity of Wearing Apparel Has Been Collected by the Ladies Committee—Committee on Patriotic Fund Held Meeting

There has been considerable gratification at the way the citizens of Fredericton are responding to appeals for assistance to the brave Belgians, whose country has been overrun and devastated by the German invaders.

Contributions of boots, shoes and practically everything in the line of wearing apparel are being received daily at the Belgium Relief Committee's headquarters at 448 Queen street. It is altogether likely that contributions will be received up until Saturday, when preparations will be made for the forwarding of the first shipment to the distracted people of Belgium.

The Knights of Pythias of Fredericton are assisting in the work of providing for the Belgian sufferers, and their contribution will take the form of a shipment of boots, shoes and clothing. At a meeting last evening a committee composed of Messrs. R. B. Wallace, Walter McKay and W. S. Tompkins was appointed to take complete charge of the arrangements and this morning it was decided to purchase the material and have the clothing for the Belgian women and children made in this city.

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MARITIME BAPTIST CONVENTION OPENS ON SATURDAY

An Interesting Program Has Been Prepared—Noted Boston Divine to Take Part—United Baptist Institute Meets on Friday

The first delegates for the Maritime Baptist Convention will arrive here this afternoon and evening, and others will come by boats and trains tomorrow. In all about three hundred are expected. The United Baptist Institute meets in the Brunswick Street church tomorrow morning at ten o'clock and there will be sessions in the afternoon and evening. The chief speakers at the Institute meeting will be Dr. J. A. Francis, pastor of the Clarendon Street Baptist church, Boston; Rev. H. T. DeWolfe, principal of Acadia Seminary; Rev. J. C. Wilson, Rev. I. S. Nowlin and Rev. W. D. Wilson. The meetings of the Institute, like all of the other meetings, are open to the public.

The convention proper opens on Saturday morning at 9.30 o'clock and will close on Wednesday evening. Mr. A. W. Stearns of Charlottetown, is the president, having succeeded Mr. Nelson B. Smith of Halifax, who passed away in January last. At each session there will be devotional exercises led by Dr. Francis of Boston. Dr. Francis is a successor of Rev. A. J. Gordon and is recognized as one of the ablest preachers of the Baptist denomination in America.

Rev. E. E. Daley has been selected to preach the convention sermon on Sunday morning at ten o'clock. It is likely that the pulpits of local evangelical churches will be occupied on Sunday by members of the convention. Rev. Dr. Francis will occupy the pulpit of the Brunswick Street Baptist church Sunday evening.

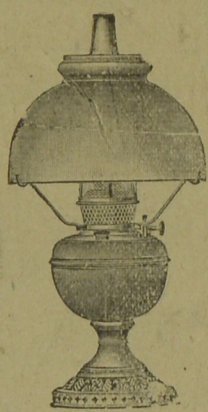
