LATE WAR DESPATCHES

Petrograd, Nov. 22.—The following official report from General Headquarters was issued tonight:—

"The fighting between the Vistula and the Warthe continued with great persistence. We have obtained some partial successes.

"The fights on the front of Czenstochowa-Cracow have resulted in no essential changes. We have taken 2,000 prisoners and some machine guns. "In Galicia the Austrians have evacuated Novy-Sandez under the pressure of our troops."

Petrograd, Nov. 22.—The German column between the Warthe and Vistula rivers, according to to-day's official reports from Russian Poland, comprises six army corps, and presents a front fifty-five miles in extent. The two rivers prevent flanking by either side, hence the fighting consists of straight frontal attacks, in which the losses of both armies are heavy, but neither side, so far, has been able to gain a marked advantage.

The Germans, military observers contend cannot advance further in this region, since the Russian concentration, which was delayed by bad roads and by a lack of railroads, now is complete.

Despatches received in Petrograd from Tiflis, Trans-Caucasia, explain that the halt in the Russian advance toward Kopykoi was due to the discovery that an entire Turkish army was massed at Erzerum. The Russians are contenting themselves, it is said, with holding their positions while awaiting reinforcements.

HAVE WARSAW AS OBJECTIVE

Petrograd, Nov. 31.—The Army Messenger, the official organ of the general staff of the Russian army, summing up recent operations in the eastern area of hostilities, publishes the following:—

"The Germans are making fresh efforts to penetrate our front between Lowicz and Skierniewice, with the object of marching on Warsaw. It seems that the enemy threw important forces in that direction.

"The effort of the Germans to march on Warsaw by penetrating our front between Kielce and Radom resulted in total failure, and our troops forced the enemy to retire along all this front. As always in its retreats, the German army lost enormous numbers in dead, wounded and prisoners, as well as provision trains, artillery and war material.

"On Nov. 18 important Austro-German forces, supporting themselves on the fortified country between Czenstochowa and Cracow, undertook an energetic offensive movement against our troops. Repulsed on all this front with heavy losses the enemy endeavored a fresh offensive movement but again our forces, by a counter-attack, drove them back with losses as heavy as those which attended the first repulse. We took a large number of prisoners.

"It is announced that there is furious fighting in the region of Cracow, the Germans realizing that this fortified position with its strong fortifications is their last protected position on this front."

London, Nov. 22.—"Messages from North Holland state that unusual activity prevails at Emden," says a despatch from the Exchange Telegraph Company's correspondent at The Hague. The Telegram continues: "Fishermen who daily cruise near the German waters, say that the German fleet is preparing for decisive action in the North Sea. Prince Henry of Prussia was at Emden yesterday for an inspection of the torpedo and submarine craft."

887 LOST ON GOOD HOPE

London, Nov. 22.—A equality list giving the names of the men lost on board the British cruiser Good Hope, which was sunk Nov. 1 in the battle off Chile with German cruisers shows that the crew, exclusive of officers, aggregated eight hundred and eighty seven.

EMDEN'S CAPTAIN REPORTS

Berlin, via London, Nov. 22.—The admiralty today received, by courtesy of the British government, through Walter Eines Page, the American ambassador to Great Britain, a brief, sailorly report of Captain Von Muller of the German cruiser Emden's last fight in which she was defeated by the Australian cruiser Sydney.

The report which was transmitted to the admiralty by Joseph C. Grew, charge d'affaires of the American embassy here, was an unadorned tale of the beating down of the Emden's fire by the Sydney's superior armament, the exhaustion of the German's ammunition, of the beaching of the helpless cruiser, and of the return of the Sydney to finish its work of destruction.

TURKISH NAVY IN BATTLE

Petrograd, Nov. 22.—The following communication from the general staff of the Russian army in the Caucasus was issued today:—

"On the morning of Nov. 21, the Turkish cruiser Hamidieh, followed by a flotilla of torpedo boats, appeared off Tuapse and opened fire, hurling

one hundred and twenty five projectiles into the neighborhood. The Russian artillery immediately replied with a very effective fire. Our losses consisted of three soldiers and a Sister of Charity wounded; one civilian killed and ten other civilians injured. The material damage was insignificant.

"In the direction of Erzerum one of our columns has made important progress above Juzveran. Our advance posts continued to tread the heels of the Turks. Other detachments are inactive."

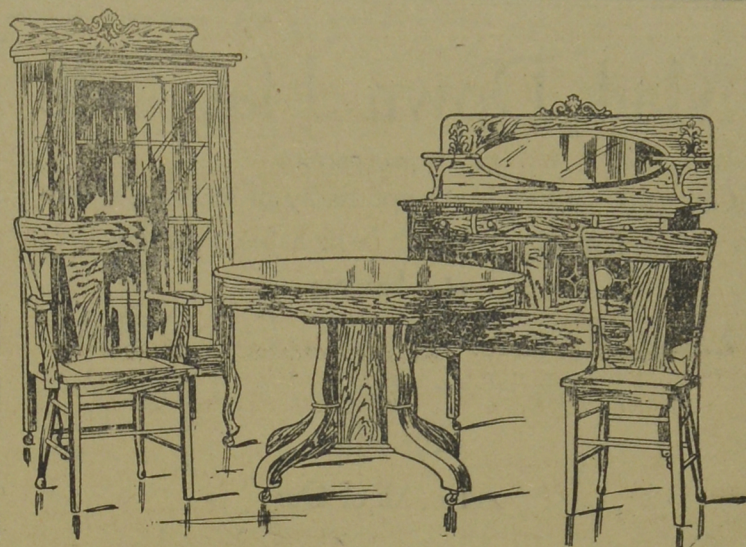

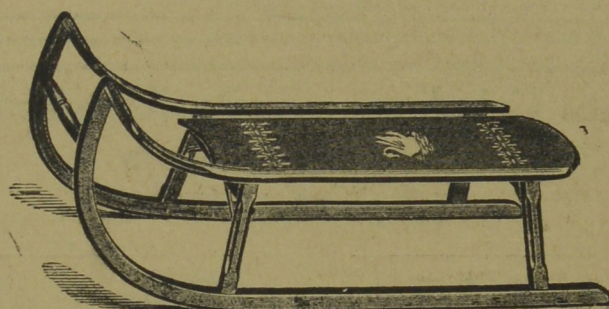
