### FUNERAL TOMORROW.

The remains of the late Mrs. Mary Ann Matheson, widow of the late John Matheson formerly a well known tailor in this city, whose death occurred at Trenton, N. J., on Wednesday, Nov. 18th, arrived here today at noon. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, services being conducted by Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith and interment at the Old Burying Ground. The late Mrs. Matheson was eighty years of age and is survived by two sons, Fred and William of Trenton N. S.

### COL. TUCKER DEAD

Lieut. Col. Joseph John Tucker died at his home in St. John yesterday at the advanced age of eighty-two years. He was a native of England and had an interesting career. In his early days he followed the sea and at the time of the Crimean war commanded a transport in the Black Sea. He was Lloyd's agent in the maritime provinces for a number of years and for twenty years represented this concern in China. He was elected M. P. for St. John with the late Hon. J. V. Ellis in 1896 and in 1900 was re-elected as the colleague of the late Hon. A. G. Blair. For some years he commanded the 62nd St. John Fusiliers. For many years he made his home with his sister, the late Mrs. C. W. Weldon.

### DIED AT MAUGERVILLE

Mr. Dennis McLuskey, one of the oldest and most respected residents of Sunbury County, passed away at his home at Maugerville early yesterday morning, after a short illness from pneumonia. He was born in Donagall, Ireland, seventy four years ago and came to Maugerville with his parents when a young boy. Five sisters, Misses Susan, Mary, Margaret and Kate, Mrs. S. G. Kilmer of Maugerville, and one brother, Henry R., at home. The death of Mr. McLuskey is the second in the family within the year, the other being that of Charles McLuskey which occurred in West Virginia. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning, leaving the house at nine o'clock. The remains will be taken to St. Anthony's Roman Catholic Church at St. Mary's, where Solemn High Mass of Requiem will be celebrated by Rev. Father Ryan.

## YOUNG INDIAN ACCIDENTLY SHOT HIMSELF

Gabe Paul, Received a Bullet in the Abdomen While Cleaning a Rifle and Died at the Victoria Hospital

Another fatal shooting accident has occurred in this vicinity since the opening of the present game hunting season. Gabe Paul, aged nineteen years, a Millicete Indian, having died at the Victoria Hospital on Saturday afternoon from being shot by a bullet from a 22 calibre rifle at the St. Mary's Indian Reserve.

Young Paul was cleaning a rifle, which his brother had used on a recent hunting trip, when it was accidentally discharged, the bullet entering his abdomen. The injured young man was rushed to the Victoria Hospital, where he passed away at four o'clock following an operation.

The deceased was a son of James Paul, the well known Indian guide, and a grandson of the late Gabe Achpin, better known as Sackem Gabe, who attended the Colonial and Indian Exhibition at London, England, some years ago. Besides his parents, who both reside at St. Mary's Reserve, he is survived by six brothers and one sister. The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, the remains being taken to St. Anthony's Catholic Church, St. Mary's, where High Mass of Requiem will be celebrated by Rev. Father Ryan. Interment will be made at Sunny Bank Cemetery.

## J. D. JAGO FIRST ARTILLERYMAN TO ENLIST HERE

Has Seen Service in the Old Country ---Col. Seely Will Return to Fredericton This Evening With Artillery Recruits

The recruiting office at the Armoury Carleton street, has been reopened by Major G. H. Grey, the recruiting officer for York, Sunbury and Charlotte counties, and this morning the following volunteers enlisted for overseas service with the second Canadian expeditionary force: James B. Juigzey of Centerville, Carleton County, James Curtis, Marysville and Charles Varhille, a Belgian, who has been employed in the cotton mill at Marysville for some time past.

The first volunteer of this city to enlist with the battery of field artillery to be mobilized is John D. Jago, who was examined and passed as medically fit by Surgeon Lieutenant Dr. W. H. Irvine this morning. His father was a colonel in a British regiment and he himself has had considerable military experience.

A large crew of carpenters have been erecting bunks at the exhibition building and today the quarters were heated in preparation for the artillerymen who it is expected will arrive here this evening with Col. T. M. Seely of Yarmouth, N. S., the commanding officer. The city water department has completed the laying of the water pipes and water can be turned on in the grounds at any time for the use of the men and horses.
